

# Golden Bears Score 16-15 Victory Over Stanford; To Meet Iowa In Rose Bowl

Berkeley, Calif. — (UPI) — California stormed into the Rose Bowl Saturday with a slender come-from-behind 16-15 victory over Stanford in the 61st renewal of the annual "big game."

Stanford sent the 81,490 fans into a frenzy with one minute to go by scoring a touchdown on a 21-yard pass from Dick Norman to Joel Freis.

The Indians could have tied the score by converting on a kick. However, they elected to win or nothing and an attempt to run the ball over for two points failed.

In a hard fought game that did not have a single penalty until five minutes before the game ended, California won the undisputed coast conference championship with a 6-1 record and the dubious honor of tangling with Iowa on New Year's Day.

The fired up Stanford squad with obvious instructions to tackle California's brilliant Joe Kapp on every play whether he had the ball or not, took the lead in the second quarter on Skip Face's 19-yard field goal.

Stanford Line Slow

But the big and slow Stanford line could not bottle up the California running attack featuring halfbacks Jack Hart and Wayne Crow.

All day long they chewed up big hunks of yardage — 5 to 10 yards at a time — and it gave the Bears ball control.

California scored the second time it got the ball, going 62 yards on nine plays, with Hart the big ground gainer.

The score came with Hart plunging over from the one. Grover Garvin picked up the extra two points on an end run, and Cal led 8-0.

Stanford came right back with its aerial attack. The big play was a double reverse with four men handling the ball, ending up with Halfback John Bond passing 39-yards to End Irv Nicolai on the Cal three.

From there Face ran around end to score, but a pass attempt from the three failed.

Face conected on his field goal in the second quarter and California got its second touchdown in the third quarter. The two markers picked up after that score, on a pass from Kapp to Crow, were the important points of the day.

California had one other scoring opportunity, getting down to the Stanford 25 in the fourth quarter. But a field goal attempt from there failed.

### UCLA Ties Trojans In 15-15 Game

Los Angeles — (UPI) — UCLA and Southern California, a pair of traditional rivals playing a bitterly-contested game, Saturday ended up with a 15-15 tie after a wild second half in which all the points were scored.

The powerful South California line gave the Trojans a big edge in rushing but USC tossed away that advantage by a half dozen fumbles that nipped several drives and led to both UCLA scores.

Tiny Don Buford, a 5-foot-5, 154-pound halfback, was a giant for Southern California with a 66-yard run and an average of 7.2 yards per carry to his credit. But Bill Kilmer was almost as great a star for UCLA as he continually brought the crowd of 58,507 to its feet with his sweeping end runs.

Kilmer, appearing in his first game after having laid out six contests with a broken wrist, did not match Buford in yardage. But he led the Bruins with 92 yards gained, and rushed over the two-point conversion for UCLA in the third period that kept them from possibly losing by a one-point margin.

Ashland — Three returning lettermen make up the sparse number of basketball veterans that are returning to the 1958-59 Southern Oregon college hoop squad which is preparing for its first game Dec. 5 against Chico State in Ashland.

Coach Ted Schopf has two regulars returning in Dave D'Olivio and Jim McAbee along with reserve guard Dave Love.

Lack of height is a problem in the Raider hoop camp with most of the tall players rounding off at about 6-3 except for inexperienced Glen Peterson towering to 6-6.

Practices have been marked by much running and the use of the fast break in an effort to make the Raiders a fast team utilizing the fast break.

Many of the newcomers have been showing some good efforts in order to make the squad as the Raiders will be playing a 24-game schedule in addition to the Far Western tournament at Humboldt State in the latter part of December.

Peterson and Dick (Hughie) Smith have been working at the post position in an effort to strengthen the weakest spot on the squad where no veterans return.

Up front in the forward wall D'Olivio, Tom Bernet, Punk Biddington, and Jack Tobiasson have been working in alternating units.

Bernet is a sharpshooter from Grants Pass by way of Shasta JC and he stands 6-1. Biddington played some years back for the Raiders and Tobiasson is a freshman from Ashland.

Guards are the one thing there are plenty of in addition to McAbee and Love. Bud Kastner, Gordie Carrigan, and Laval Meunier are all local Rogue Valley boys from the Medford area while Chuck Nevi, up from the Jayvees, is from Grants Pass.

Freshmen Richard Bogart and Rick Herman from Springfield are out and working with the varsity with Bogart being a guard and Herman a forward.

Last year the Raiders completed the season with a 19-9 record and ended up in second place in the Oregon Collegiate conference.

Oregon Tech, winner in the OCC last year, is expected to be one of the biggest hurdles for the Raiders to overcome if they are to get into the playoffs in Portland at the end of the season.

Eastern Oregon could prove to be a big surprise this season due to the fact they have all five of their first string returning for another season of play.

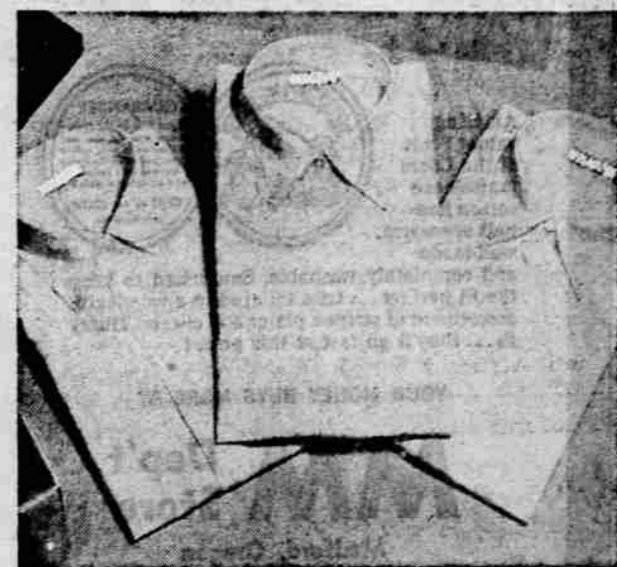

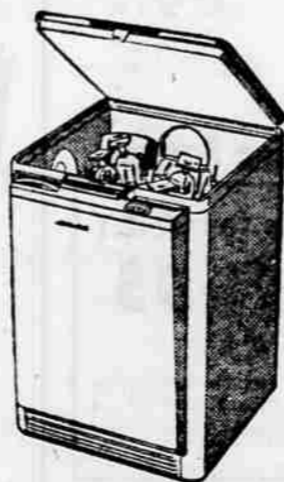
