### Army, Navy Fracas Has Grid Spotlight

Army and Navy tangled next Saturday and practically everyone in the nation will take sides except a handful of other teams, which will be concentrating instead on taking a trip to the bowl.

Although the traditional service classic between the Cadets and the Middies at Philadelphia figures to overshadow all other football business on Saturday, the Air Force Academy, Clemson and possibly a few other teams can clinch bowl berths depending on how they fare this week.

Army, which has won seven games and has only a 14-14 tie against Pittsburgh to mar its season record, undoubtedly will be at least a one-touchdown favorite against Navy, a six-game winner this year but a two-time loser—to Tulane and Notre Dame.

The Black Knights own a slight edge in the inter-service rivalry that dates back to 1890. Since then, Army has won 29 of the games, Navy 24 and five of the clashes wound up in ties. Navy won last year's game, 14-0.

But all the odds and blackboard calculations go out the window when the two academies get together on the gridiron. No matter what has gone before, either Army or Navy automatically considers it a successful season if it wins this one.

The Air Force Academy, which rolled up a 45-7 margin over New Mexico last Saturday, meets Colorado in its season wind-up next Saturday and a victory virtually will insure Ben Martin's Falcons a spot in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas on New Year's day opposite Texas Christian.

Texas Christian won the Southwest Conference championship and the accompanying Cotton Bowl berth by defeating Rice, 21-10, last Saturday.

Clemson, a leading candidate for a Sugar bowl berth opposite Louisiana State, could help rush the invitation with a wrap-up victory over Furman. LSU agreed to serve as host team in the Sugar Bowl after completing its first perfect campaign in 50 years by mauling Tulane, 62-0.

**Gator Bowl Still Open**  
 There is a good chance that Gator Bowl officials will extend formal invitations following the results of next Saturday's games.

The Air Force Academy and Clemson also are under consideration for the Gator Bowl game at Jacksonville, Fla., Dec. 27, as well as Pittsburgh, Mississippi, Texas, Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt, Florida and Mississippi Southern, the nation's No. 1 small college team.

Mississippi Southern, owner of an 8-0 record, finishes its season against Chattanooga on Thursday.

In other Thanksgiving Day contests, Pittsburgh faces Penn State; Texas meets Texas A&M; South Carolina opposes Wake Forest; Brown plays Colgate and Pennsylvania meets Cornell.

Besides the Army-Navy struggle on Saturday, Alabama plays Auburn; Baylor meets Rice; Georgia faces Georgia Tech; Mississippi goes against Mississippi State; Florida plays host to Miami, Fla.; Oklahoma State meets Oklahoma; Southern California opposes Notre Dame; Southern Methodist tangles with Texas Christian; and Vanderbilt meets Tennessee.

**Zora Folley Encounters Bygraves**  
 New York (UPI)—Two international heavyweight bouts command the most attention on this week's boxing schedule.

Zora Folley of Chandler, Ariz., third ranking contender, will try to redeem himself internationally by beating Joe Bygraves of England at Leicester, Eng., tonight. It will be Folley's first start since he was surprisingly outpointed by England's Henry Cooper at London last month. Bygraves is unrated.

Heavyweights Mike DeJohn of Syracuse, N.Y., and Willi Besmanoff of Germany meet in a (NBC) TV-radio 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden, Friday night.

**Dejohn Favored**  
 Dejohn, ranked ninth by the National Boxing Association is favored at 7-5 over unrated Besmanoff. Dejohn's 35-5-1 record includes 25 knockouts. Besmanoff's 37-13-7 list includes 14 kayoes.

Wednesday night's TV (ABC) 10-rounder at Louisville, Ky., brings together middleweights Yama Bahama of Bimini, British West Indies, and Rudel Stitch of Louisville. Bahama is favored at 13-10 over Stitch. Neither is rated among the top 10.

Bahama scored 17 knockouts while winning 48 of his 38 bouts. Stitch's 15-4-0 record includes eight kayoes.

Without benefit of TV, former middleweight champion Bobo Olson meets Paddy Young of New York at Oakland, Calif., Tuesday night. They are fighting as light heavyweights now.

### Rams Vow Revenge

Baltimore (UPI)—The Rams virtually stripped of their championship aspirations by Baltimore, today vowed to gain revenge when they meet the Colts in Los Angeles in two weeks and turned their thoughts to Sunday's game against the Cardinals.

"You can't fumble six times, have four passes intercepted and beat a team like the Colts," coach Sid Gillman concluded as he reviewed the 34-7 defeat that left the Rams three games behind the Colts with three games to play.

Los Angeles fumbles and Colt interceptions set up three of the five Baltimore scores as well as halting Ram drives twice in the shadow of the Colt goalposts.

Although the Colts never trailed the Rams closed the gap to six points in the third period, 13-7, only to fall apart in the final quarter and give up three touchdowns.

**Unites Tough As Ever**  
 Johnny Unites, returning to action after two weeks, showed on the Colts' first play from scrimmage that he had lost none of his passing ability by hitting halfback Lenzie Moore with a 58-yard touchdown pass.

But the ball-hawking Colts were not content with that and in the second period halfback Carl Taseff grabbed one of Bill Wade's passes on the Rams' 30 and raced it to the 18. Moore scored a few plays later from the eight.

Del Shofner appeared to have a touchdown a few minutes later when he was tackled by the Colts.

utes later in the period when he caught one of Wade's passes on the three and ran towards the goal only to fumble on the one with Ray Brown recovering.

The Rams did get a score in the third period on an 83-yard drive which ended with Tommy Wilson scoring from the four.

**Arnett Fumbles**  
 But in the final period the closely-defensed Jon Arnett let the ball squirt out of his arms on a punt return with the Colts recovering on the 20. Unites then passed 12 yards to end Jim Mutcheller to again give the Colts a 13-point lead.

Another long pass from Unites to Moore, good for 50 yards, put the Colts inside the Rams' 20. Alan Ameche powered the ball down to the one and Unites sneaked over for the score.

The final touchdown came after Wilson fumbled the next kickoff and Billy Prier recovered on the Rams 20. L. G. Dupre plunged over from the six.

**Hines Woman Shot; Grandson Quizzed**  
 Burns, Ore. (UPI)—A woman was shot to death at Hines Sunday night and juvenile authorities and sheriff's deputies today were questioning her 11-year-old grandson.

Mrs. Bessie Davis was shot to death with a .22 caliber rifle while sitting in a chair watching television, sheriff's officers said. They were questioning the grandson, Larry Davis.

Deputy Sheriff McKinley Lowe said the boy and his grandmother apparently had had an argument. The shooting occurred about 7:15 p. m.

The Baltimore Colts are galloping toward their first pro football division title in 10 seasons and the Cleveland Browns are edging toward their 12th in 13 campaigns.

Coach Weeb Ewbank's Colts, led by John Unitas and Lenny Moore, scored 21 points in six minutes during the final period Sunday to crush the Los Angeles Rams, 34-7. Baltimore, which has whipped its closest pursuers in its last two starts, held its two-game lead in the National league's Western division with only three to play. The Colts kicked the Rams three games off the pace.

Coach Paul Brown's Cleveland club clung to its one-game margin over the New York Giants in the Eastern Division by defeating the Philadelphia Eagles, 28-14. New York, which slipped out of a first-place tie with Cleveland by bowing to the Pittsburgh Steelers Nov. 16, bounced back by blanking the Washington Redskins, 30-0.

The Chicago Bears, 17-0 victims of the Colts a week ago, remained two games behind Baltimore by rallying to down the Detroit Lions, 20-7. The defeat officially ended Detroit's slim hopes of keeping the Western Division and league titles.

**Steelers Best Cards**  
 Pittsburgh remained a game behind New York and two behind Cleveland by defeating the Chicago Cardinals, 27-20, on Bobby Layne's 78-yard pass-run touchdown toss to Jack Orr in the last six minutes. Ollie Matson of the Cardinals raced 101 yards to score with the first kickoff.

In the other games, Y. A. Tittle threw two scoring passes to Billy Wilson and one to R. C. Owens to spark the San Francisco Forty-Niners to a 33-12 victory over the Green Bay Packers.

Each of the 12 clubs has three more games.

Unitas, who missed two games with cracked ribs, returned to Baltimore's quarterback post Sunday and bombed the Rams with their own favorite weapon on the first play from scrimmage. He fired to Moore and Lenny raced 58 yards to score.

Moore also ran eight yards to score in the second period but the Colts were clinging to a 13-7 lead when they thrilled a capacity home crowd of 57,557 with their last-period spree. Unites passed 12 yards to Jim Mutcheller and plunged a yard while L. G. Dupre ran six for three quick touchdowns.

**Eagles Contain Brown**  
 The Eagles held Jim Brown, record-busting Cleveland fullback to 66 yards on 20 carries but took their eyes off Bobby Mitchell for a few seconds in the first period and never recovered. The 51,319 Cleveland fans were just getting settled when Bobby took the opening kickoff on his two and went 98 yards to score. A few minutes later, he ran 68 with a punt to make it 14-0. Lew Carpenter's plunge and Milt Plum's pass to Ray Renfro provided Cleveland's other touchdowns. Bill Barnes plunged and Norm Van Brocklin passed to Tommy McDonald for Philadelphia's touch-
