

Four Medford Players on All-League Eleven

Dean, Winterbottom Of GP Club Repeat On 1st Aggregation

Back Jack Dean and Guard Wendell Winterbottom, of Grants Pass high's co-champion Cavemen, are lone repeaters from last year on the first unit of the Medford Mail Tribune's 1958 Southern Oregon Conference All-Star Football squad.

Four players from Medford, which shared the title and went on into state A-1 play-offs, three from Crater, one from Ashland and two others from Grants Pass round out a 12-man all-league crew.

End John Fox and Center Reed Daugherty complete the Grants Pass quartet. No Medford back was chosen for the first contingent but Ends Lowell Dean and Pete Rasmussen, Tackle Lynn Knight and Guard John Frohnmayer are on the team. Picked from Crater were Backs Wayne Allen and Kerman Bennett and Tackle Dave Brown. Back Alan McKinnis was the Ashland choice.

Players Vote
Coaches and teams of the five conference schools voted in the poll, balloting on all-opponent basis. Players had direct participation in the vote for the first time, at least in recent years. Ten ballots were cast and two points given for first team pick and one for second team selection. Two points were needed for honorable mention.

Jack Dean drew the top vote, getting 16 points as choice of all rival teams and coaches. Daugherty, Allen and Bennett totaled 14 counters each.

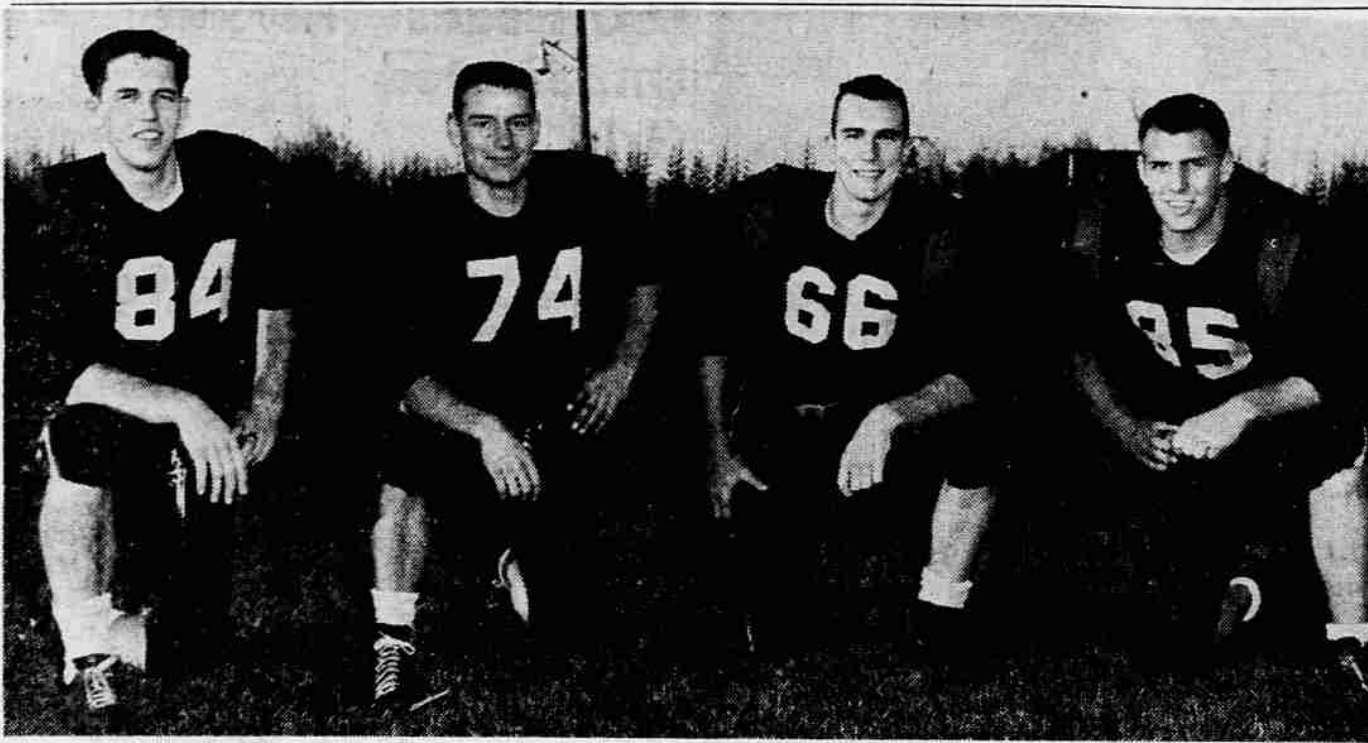
Closest voting was at the end and tackles. Lowell Dean with 12 topped the flankman poll, one more point than Fox and Rasmussen who tied for first team berth. The latter two edged Gary Kranenburg, Klamath Falls, who made the second unit.

At tackle Knight and Brown, with 10, won out by one point over Gary Winetrout of Medford and Bob Rosenbaum of Ashland. The second team tackle choices in turn beat out Mike Murray of Medford who got 12 points but just eight of them at tackle. Four others were at guard.

Five on Second
Medford dominated the second team with five selections. Tackle Winetrout, Guard George Ice, Center Dennis Barr and Backs Skip Bennett and Ron Reich. Grants Pass placed three, Crater two and Klamath Falls and Ashland each one. Twelve men again were named because George Hunt and Ollie Woolsey of Grants Pass tied at guard.

The Mail Tribune asked for votes at linebacker positions. However, only two coaches and their squads responded and the vote was not considered representative. Therefore, the top two linebacker votegetters have been accorded special citation. Fred and Al Funston of Medford gained this mention.

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SF Coach Says Line Big Factor

Milwaukee, Wis.—(UP)—Coach Frankie Albert of San Francisco today credited a return to form by his team's offensive line as the big factor in the Forty Niners' 33-12 National Football League win over Green Bay.

Forty Niner backs Hugh McElhenny and Joe Perry were repeatedly sprung loose as they gained 159 and 73 yards respectively.

"It was the first time we got lanes open for our backs this season, allowing them to move with freedom," he said. Albert shrugged off the brags which dotted Sunday's tussle.

"Temper flared up, that's all," the voluble coach said. "Those things will happen."

Neither the Forty Niner players involved nor referee Bob Austin were able to pinpoint the cause of the fights. One sideline observer said he believed that the main trouble was that Green Bay's defensive platoon became frustrated with the inability of the team's offensive unit to move the ball.

Big Offensive Effort
The Californians gained 539 yards to Green Bay's 236. But at the end of three quarters, the San Franciscans were lucky to hold a 12-12 tie. The Packers stopped drive after drive inside the 20 and might have led had not the usually reliable Billy Howton dropped a pass in the end zone.

Y. A. Tittle hit Billy Wilson with a 6 yard scoring toss in early minutes of play to culminate a 43 yard drive. Minutes later Green Bay uncorked an 80 yard drive with Vito Parilli tossing 16 yards to Howton for the score.

The rest of the first three periods was a bizarre battle of field goals. Green Bay's Paul Hornung made two and had two blocked while Gordy Soltau made two, missed two and saw two blocked by a Green Bay line led by linebacker Tom Bettis, a real toughie all day.

The Packers crumbled in the final period. Tittle found R. C. Owens on a 23-yard
