Alaskans Prepare To Cast Ballots For Congressmen

Anchorage, Alaska — (UPI) — Politicians fired their final campaign barrage today as Alaskans prepared to vote to send two senators and a representative to Congress. About 30,000 persons are expected to ballot Tuesday in an election which will see Alaskans select their own governor for the first time and choose a legislature. Mike Stepiovich, Republican from Fairbanks, and Ernest Gruening, Democrat, will battle for a Senate seat in what shapes up as the hottest race on the ballot. Stepiovich, a 39-year-old attorney, was the only Republican for one of Alaska's top offices who out-polled the Democratic side of the ballot in the primary election. Gruening, 72, served as Alaska's governor for 14 years. His opponent resigned as territorial governor to run for the Senate. In Democratic Bag the other Senate seat is regarded as in the Democratic bag. E. L. (Bob) Bartlett, Alaska's Congressional delegate for the past 14 years, is regarded as a shoo-in over Republican R. E. Robertson, 73. Bartlett is a popular figure in Alaska politics and last week was endorsed by the Republican League for Better Government which in a paid political ad in an Anchorage newspaper urged voters to send Bartlett to Washington. The new state will have only one seat in the House of Representatives. Henry A. Benson, 48, a Juneau Republican, and Ralph J. Rivers, 55, a Fairbanks attorney, are the opponents. Economy Platform Benson currently is Alaska's Commissioner of Labor. Rivers was U. S. Attorney in Alaska for 12 years and served 4 years as territorial attorney general.

Sawmill Accident Brings Civil Suit

A complaint asking \$35,000 general damages and \$3,000 for loss of wages from the Lithia Lumber company, Ashland, has been filed in circuit court by Joseph M. Snyder Jr., Klamath Falls.

According to the complaint Snyder, an employee of the lumber company, was feeding a wood saw Nov. 2, 1958, at the mill when a four foot slab fell from a conveyor nearby, crushing his left hand. Snyder charges that the company was careless and negligent in its operation and violated the basic safety code.

Due to the accident, the plaintiff has been unable to work at his occupation as a sawmill laborer and has had numerous operations on his hand, the complaint states. Attorney for Snyder is Donald A. W. Piper, Klamath Falls.

Stock Values Dip In Active Market

New York — (UPI) — Stocks fell by \$5 billion dollars in valuation of all listed issues in an active market today.

Tickers ran late through most of the morning when the sales were heavy. Then came a moderate recovery with another drop late in the fifth hour with the tape again falling behind the market.

Losses ranged to more than five points with the widest in steel, oil, drugs, televisions, chemicals, communications, electronics, building and special issues. Coppers were hard hit by a new softening in the price structure for copper metal.

The decline was the widest since Oct. 21, 1957. Trading increased as prices fell.

Losses at their worst ranged to five points or more in such stocks as Zenith, Western Maryland, International Business Machines, and Polaroid.

Losses of three points or more appeared in American Home Products, Colgate, Du Pont, Eastman, U. S. Steel, Texas Instruments, Smith Kline & French, Merck, Dow Chemical, International Telephone, and Goodyear.

Greater Military Unity Requested

San Francisco — (UPI) — Gen. Thomas S. Power, commander of the Strategic Air Command, called Thursday night for greater unity in the nation's military forces.

Power made his plea at the 11th annual west coast dinner of the National Security Industrial Association.

Urging an end to bickering and feuds among top military commanders, Power said: "We must decide exactly whom we are trying to deter. From what I hear and read, I sometimes get the impression that we are trying to deter one another, rather than the Communists."

"Surely we are not enhancing the deterrent value of our team if its members publicly criticize and belittle the capabilities of their teammates instead of stressing the overall strength of the team and their part in it."
