D'Autremont Parole Carefully Weighed by Board

The parole board Monday after carefully weighing the issue, decided upon freedom. "I haven't had time for this to sink in. Perhaps it will begin to percolate after a while," D'Autremont said when informed of the news.

The first time he was out of the prison during the last 31 years was this year when he was taken by car over the new Baldock Freeway from Salem and Portland for a court hearing. He said he was impressed with the new automobiles and particularly the smooth roads.

He said he had never watched television except in a few movies at the prison but that it didn't read about it and that it didn't seem to be too good. "I'm not anxious to see it," he said.

D'Autremont, his once sandy-colored hair now graying at the temples, said he wanted to find a job in a printing shop and live in obscurity. "I've had all the publicity I need," he said.

Model Prisoner
Deputy Warden Gregory Boyd said Hugh, who has worked in the prison print shop since 1932, was a model prisoner. "He was as reliable as a hired worker. Society has received its pound of flesh," Boyd added.

Former Oregon Attorney General George Neuner, who assisted in the prosecution of Hugh and his twin brothers, Roy and Ray, for the murder-train robbery said the parole was an "outrage."

"It was a diabolic crime," he said. "They murdered four people there. It just goes to show that a sentence of the court doesn't mean anything, nor the expression of a jury."

D'Autremont's stepmother, Mrs. Nellie D'Autremont of Eugene, said she was delighted that Hugh was being released after all these years. She said Hugh and his brothers were "good kids except for this one thing—the robbery."

Southern Pacific railroad officials had no comment on the parole announcement.

The four men who died in the robbery attempt were Sidney Bates, engineer; Marvin Seng, fireman; C. O. Johnson, brakeman, all shot, and E. E. Dougherty, postal clerk, killed in the blast.

Oregon Student Takes Own Life

Carmel -UPI- A Monterey Peninsula college student shot himself to death with a rifle Monday while his landlady was attempting to telephone police for help.

The victim was identified as Otis Weaver Burchell, 24, Valsetz, Ore. Authorities found no reason for his action.

The youth's landlady, Mrs. Janet Allen, told police Burchell was acting strangely Sunday night and went for a walk. When he returned early Monday, she saw him take the rifle from under a couch.

Mrs. Allen tried to take the rifle from Burchell and then ran to call police when she was unsuccessful. The youth fired the fatal bullet as she was dialing the police station.

Officers Louis Bayer and Roger Tappendoff said they received a call at 2:30 a.m. that a service station on N.E. 83rd ave. had been held up. They said they spotted a car answering the description of the getaway vehicle and gave chase.

The suspects jumped from the car and Grogan halted when police drew revolvers. Neal fled but was found hiding under an old car and ordered out at gunpoint.

De Gaulle Seen As Main Balance Wheel of Group

Paris -UPI- Premier Charles de Gaulle emerged today as the main balance wheel of a new National Assembly expected to be overwhelmingly right-wing.

De Gaulle has been accused by Communists and other left-wing elements of going all out for a right-wing regime, but election results indicate his views are farther to the left than those of most members of the new cabinet.

Biggest winner in the first round of the elections was the Union for the New Republic (UNR), a party set up by ambitious Information Minister Jacques Soustelle a few months ago. The UNR campaigned on an out-right Gaullist platform and won much support from Frenchmen who regard the general as the man who saved the nation from civil war last May and June.

Only 42 of the 465 deputies from Metropolitan France were elected Sunday and experts predicted the UNR would have around 130 seats in the new assembly after next Sunday's record round of voting.

With the support of the 71 deputies from Algeria—almost all of whom are expected to be far right wingers—the UNR will form by far the largest parliamentary bloc.

\$110,922 Raised In Crusade Drive

A total of \$110,922, 84 per cent of the \$131,030 goal, has been collected in the United Medford Crusade campaign, workers reported at yesterday's report meeting.

Money collected equals about the amount collected at this time last year, but the percentage is lower, officials said. This is because the campaign goal this year is larger.

The logging section of the lumber division reached 100 per cent of its goal last week, chairman reported, and the professional division reported reaching its goal.

Dick Nelson, special events chairman, reported that \$164,80 has been raised by YMCA Tri-Hi-Y clubs through dances held after recent football games.

Dick Travis, general campaign chairman, asked residents who have pledged cards to contact the United Medford Crusade at SP Ring 3-4287. "Medford is the only city in the state that has never failed to reach its established goal," he said, and "this record is at stake now."

Governors Split On Education Aid

Honolulu -UPI- Democratic and Republican governors divided along party lines Monday in a debate about federal aid to education.

The debate took place at the opening session of the Western Governors conference. The Democrats said the job was too big for the states while Republicans said the states could do the job cheaper.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes of Oregon, a Democrat, staunchly defended continued and broadened federal aid to education.
