

Political Committee Opens Cyprus Talks

United Nations N. Y. — The 18-nation U. N. political committee opens debate today on Cyprus.

Three resolutions, submitted by Britain, Greece and Turkey, the three parties to the bitter dispute over the Mediterranean island, were before the committee.

The British proposal asked U. N. blessing for its seven-year plan calling for Greek and Turkish cooperation in governing the island.

The Greek resolution, submitted last Saturday, urged creation of a five-nation good offices committee to work for

complete independence of the island.

The Turkish proposal asked that the solution to the problem be left to the three nations involved. Although the Turkish resolution does not say so, the Turks have been pushing for partition of the island.

TUNISIANS ON TRIAL

Tunis — Fifty-eight Tunisians are being tried here on charges of plotting with Egyptian agents to assassinate President Habib Bourguiba and overthrow his pro-Western government.

Varicose Veins

Hundreds of people want to know if there is any medical treatment

worth trying for their varicose veins, and I have to tell them that I don't know of any. Certainly, there isn't anything that one could take by mouth that would be likely to do any good. Varicose veins do not always have to be removed, simply because they are large. They need to be removed if they are causing a lot of swelling in the leg, if they are causing pain, or if they are causing an ulcer to develop on the inner side of an ankle. Sometimes they are removed because an expert sees that, with the breaking down of the little valves in the veins which help the blood to keep moving upward, the condition is going to get worse and worse.

Some women get along well enough with the help of an elastic stocking or bandage. Sometimes the condition gets worse when one of the veins

gets inflamed and the woman suffers what is often called a "milk leg," or a phlebitis.

Some people get the veins injected, but experts tell me that they have no faith in this type of treatment; it usually doesn't work well enough, and it doesn't give permanent relief. The common operation now done is what is called "stripping." A little cut is made over the vein farther up the leg, and through this cut the stripped veins is removed. The blood then goes through the veins that are deep in the muscles of the legs, and hence are better protected from dilation.

Persons Who Cannot Wear Dental Plates

Many elderly persons are very unhappy because, after having had all their teeth extracted, they now cannot wear plates. An upper plate gets them and perhaps a lower plate burns them.

Usually, when such a person comes into the office, it is a woman of 50, and I soon find that she is an abnormally sensitive and perhaps fussy person who tells me that in the past she was unable to brush her back teeth, because it made her gag. I know well her type, and usually I wish devoutly that I could have seen her before she had her teeth removed; I could then hold her that she would probably never be able to wear them, and would end up carrying around three or four sets in her bag.

I remember once having as a patient the leading prosthetic (plate-maker) in his state. He was a man about 60, when I saw him, was a bunch of nerves; he was tired out so jittery he was afraid he was going to crack up and get a nervous breakdown. Finally, he said, "You know, I would have no trouble if it weren't for a half-dozen women each month who insist on having their plates made over and over again. I can never make one to suit them. One plate will gag them, another one they think has the teeth too far forward, another plate they think has the teeth too far back, and another one they think has teeth of the wrong color. They finally say that what they must have is a plate of gold or platinum or something. These women nearly drive me to drink."

I said to him, "Look, doctor, surely you must be able to recognize those women the minute they come in, so why don't you tell them that you don't know how to help them, and that you prefer not to try. Then your life will be bearable." He said, "That's right; that's what I should have done long ago; that's what I am going to do now." A few years later, when again I met him, he had nearly hugged me; he said he had done what I had suggested, and life had become easy.

Brush Control Meeting Planned

A meeting to explain the best methods of brush control will be held in the Jackson county courthouse at 8 p.m., today, according to Peter Trim, local representative of a chemical sales firm.

A talk accompanied by a film will explain best methods of using the brush, grass suppression and weed control chemicals. The session is jointly sponsored by representatives of chemical firms, Jackson county extension service and Ray Rubbel, county weed control supervisor.

Spread of brush, wild roses, blackberries and weeds give the farmer a continual problem, Trim said. Over half of a 4,000 acre ranch may be overrun with blackberry bushes, wild roses, poison oak and various types of brush. However, proper use of chemicals can give as high as 75 to 100 per cent control.

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Florida Man Arraigned Before Commissioner

Charles D. Sinclair, 23, of Orlando, Fla., was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Frank Van Dyke in Medford Monday on a federal charge of violating the Dyer act, transporting a stolen automobile across state lines. He waived preliminary hearing and is being held in Jackson county jail on \$1,500 bail.

Sinclair was arrested Oct. 25 by Ashland city police for switched license plates and was sentenced to 30 days in the Ashland city jail.

Further investigation disclosed the fact that the automobile had been stolen in Los Angeles.

PIPPIN THE GREAT

St. Louis, Mo.—UPI—Harold Pippin said Monday he didn't bag any deer on a recent hunting trip but did shoot his car's exhaust pipe. He couldn't get the auto started after smashing the exhaust pipe when he hit a tree, Pippin said, so he took dead aim and shot the pipe free.
