San Francisco (UPI)—The gloom was thicker than the famed San Francisco fog today in the Bay Area college basketball ranks.

Phil Woolpert, coach of the usually successful University of San Francisco Dons, set the key-note address with an announcement that he is "coaching intra-mural basketball" this season.

Coach Pete Newell of California claims that his club is so poor shooting that the basket at one end of the court was taken down by the janitor for repairs and the squad played 45 minutes before it was missed.

Said Coach Van Sweet of College of Pacific: "We go on tour to play Illinois, Purdue and Cincinnati on successive nights. I understand Illinois lost a player from last year's team; and Purdue lost one."

"The reason we scheduled Cincinnati was to see Oscar Robertson perform. Personally, I'd rather see him on a movie screen."

Argentinian Gets 15th Knockout

New York (UPI)—Victor Zalazar, Argentina's "wild bullet" who registered his 15th knockout in his 15th professional bout Monday night, may fight middleweight Benny Paret of Cuba at St. Nicholas arena, Dec. 15.

Lanky, black-haired Zalazar, 23, gave such a bloody battering to Frank Keating of Wallingford, Conn., at St. Nick's Monday night that referee Arthur Mercante stopped the bout at 41 seconds of the eighth round.

Rugged brown-haired Keating, who had been staggered in every round, was bleeding from cuts about both eyes and from the mouth and nose when the referee awarded Zalazar a technical knockout.

Elliott's Bears Earn Trip To Rose Bowl Second Time

San Francisco (UPI)—Soft-spoken Pete Elliott, the handsome young guiding genius of California's Golden Bears, makes his second trip to the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day when he sends his team into battle against Iowa.

If any precedent is needed to point the way, the last time Pete was in the Pasadena saucer, he was a member of the Michigan team that massacred Southern California, 49-0.

California isn't expected to manhandle Iowa in this fashion—but Pete's fans think he may be able to bring his club up to the place where it will give the Hawkeyes a solid battle. Iowa is expected to be at least a two-touchdown favorite.

This may account for the fact that the Bears this year have recovered 11 fumbles from the opposition.

He builds up his players all during the year. He has averaged using 18 sophomores in every game this year; and he has averaged using 34 players per game—win or lose. This has resulted in tremendous morale.

Right after the Oregon State loss, California had to pull in a pair of third string men to fill in for injured players.

A Little Psychology
California's tiny line, one of the smallest in the West, has been outstanding this year in making possible the pass-run option play work for the brilliant split-T quarterback, Joe Kapp.

With this philosophy going into the Rose Bowl, California can be expected to give a good account of itself.

The team may not win, but it won't be disgraced.

"I have no doubt whatsoever that the games will be held as scheduled and will be successful," said J. Lyman Bingham, chairman of the U.S. Olympic committee.

Bingham added that "although recent criticism has caused some unfounded rumors" about plans for the games "preparations are so far advanced that I cannot conceive of anything short of a major catastrophe, such as a war, that would prevent it from being staged."
