

Penn State Knocks Pittsburgh Out of Grid Bowl Picture

Rutgers bowed gracefully out of the post-season football bowl picture today and Pittsburgh was rudely bounced out as the hour for filling the last remaining bowl berths drew rapidly nearer.

Pittsburgh, a Gator Bowl hopeful, became the main casualty of the Thanksgiving Day holiday when it blew a 14-0 halftime lead and lost to old rival Penn State, 25-21. The defeat scratched the Panthers from the list of teams being considered by the Gator Bowl committee at a special meeting today.

Texas, impressive 27-0 victor over Texas A&M in the holiday's nationally televised game, was on that list—along with Mississippi, Florida, Van-

Randy Duncan Big 10's Top All-Star Choice

Chicago—UPI—Iowa's Big Ten champions placed only one man, quarterback Randy Duncan, on the All-Big Ten football team picked for United Press International by the league's coaches runner-up, Wisconsin failed to win a position and third place Ohio State got three spots.

Duncan, the national leader in total offense and second in passing, was the leading choice of the coaches, one of two players placed on either the first, second or third all-conference team by the mentors. The only other player to win mention on every ballot was Purdue's giant tackle, Gene Selawski, who finished barely behind Duncan in the point totals.

None Unanimous
No player was a unanimous first team choice, but there was little difference of opinion as to which 11 men were the best in the league.

Ohio State's Bob White was placed at fullback, another Buckeye, Don Clark, made the team at halfback even though he was hampered by injury for a large part of the season, and the third Ohio State player was tackle Jim Marshall.

Illinois and Michigan State each grabbed two first team positions, with End Rich Kreitling and guard Bill Burrell placing for the Illini and guard Ellison Kelly and end Sam Williams winning votes for the Spartans.

The other all conference players were halfback Ron Burton of Northwestern and center Mike Svendsen of Minnesota.

Prothro Spikes Move Rumors

Corvallis—UPI—Oregon State football coach Tommy Prothro today spiked reports that he might head for another school, such as Duke or UCLA.

"There's not a thing to it," he said.

Prothro said that when he came to Oregon State he said only that he wanted to be associated with a school which had a healthy, active athletic program. "My attitude hasn't changed . . ." he said.

Prothro added, "after losing to arch-rival Oregon 20-0 there must be some OSC fans who would like to see me go. But I'm sorry to disappoint them, I'm staying."

Earl Buchholz In Tenth Final

Sydney, Australia—UPI—The scheduled clash between the junior tennis champions of the United States and Australia won't come off today because the Yank has bigger things in mind.

Earl Buchholz, 18-year-old U. S. and Wimbledon junior champ, had been slated to face Aussie junior ace Marty Mulligan in a semi-final match of juniors singles today in the New South Wales championships. But that was before Buchholz went on a rampage in the regular men's competition.

4 Seniors May Start For Pilots

Portland—A senior-studded University of Portland basketball team opens its 1958-59 campaign Wednesday, Dec. 3, against a strong Brigham Young contingent at Portland's newly-renovated Pacific-International pavilion.

Four seniors are expected to be in the starting lineup against the Cougars; forwards Elmen (Red) Bloedel, 6-4; Dick Jolley, 6-1; and guards Wally Panel and Jim Armstrong, 6-0. Sophomore Jim Altenhofen, 6-5 center, is the other probable starter.

The Pilots figure to be a "running" ball club due to the lack of height and the presence of "small men" Panel, Armstrong and Jolley, who are expected to share most of the scoring honors this year. One, Two, In Point

Armstrong and Jolley ranked 1-2 in point production last year and Panel topped the scoring statistics as a sophomore.

Other Portland team members are sophomores Bob Bradach and Chuck Rogers, 6-8 centers; Bob Hevener, 6-3 forward; Doug Stewart, 6-1 guard; and forward Roland Carpenter, 6-3 forward.

Portland competes Friday and Saturday, Dec. 5-6, in the Idaho State hoop tournament, featuring the Pilots, Idaho State, Montana State and Utah State. The Pilots are scheduled to play Montana State in the first game on Friday.

The Pilots entertain Pacific Lutheran and University of Alaska at the P-I, Dec. 10 and 14, respectively.

Army-Navy Pass Duel Anticipated

Philadelphia—UPI—Army and Navy are expected to engage in an aerial circus when they meet for the 59th time Saturday on the near-frozen turf of Municipal Stadium in a nationally televised battle.

Both teams have displayed fine passing attacks this season and have given every indication they plan to stick to their overhead game for the service classic.

Army, formerly noted for its crunching ground maneuvers, will enter Saturday's game as the nation's No. 1 passing team. The Cadets have scored 13 of their 16 touchdowns through the air this season while going unbeaten in eight games.

Quarterback Joe Caldwell and halfback Bob Anderson both are excellent passers, but Army Coach Earl Blaik still feels Navy has a better air attack centered around quarterback Joe Tranachini.

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Lions Nose Green Bay

Detroit—UPI—Coach George Wilson admitted his Detroit Lions weren't as sharp as usual in their Thanksgiving Day battle with the Green Bay Packers but quickly pointed out, "I'd rather win a bad game than lose a good one."

The Lions gained only 194 yards against the Packers in the nationally televised battle but still posted a 24-14 victory over the National Football league cellar-dwellers.

Green Bay, which has only one victory and a tie in 10 games, will get the first choice as the last place team in the league.

The other 10 NFL teams were idle Thursday but return to action Sunday. San Francisco is at Baltimore, Washington at Cleveland, Los Angeles at the Chicago Cardinals, the Chicago Bears at Pittsburgh and Philadelphia at New York.

New Look Oregon Ducks Play OSC Quint Monday

University of Oregon, Eugene—Oregon's "new look" Webfoots, shy on height but probably as experienced as the 158 squad which finished 13-11, open against Oregon State's Beavers in Corvallis Monday in a non-conference hoop contest.

Despite the informality of it all, the first of three between the bitter rivals is expected to shed pertinent light on the Duck's basketball fortunes during the coming campaign. They follow the OSC lidlifter with five straight inter-sectional home games.

Missing from the Webfoot squad will be their two highest scorers of last winter, Charlie Franklin and Hal Duffy, but Coach Steve Belko will have three experienced veterans in the starting lineup Monday, letterman junior and a touted sophomore.

Barring an unexpected change of strategy, Belko, starting his third year as the Oregon hoop boss, will go with guards Bud Kuykendall and Chuck Rask, plus forwards Dale Herron, Stu Robertson and Denny Strickland. Kimpston to Play

Kuykendall, Rask and Herron are the trio which contributed so much to the Webfoot's exciting success finish last year. Robertson was a stellar reserve and Strickland comes from the strong frosh club.

It comes as no surprise that the Webfoots, for the sake of a balanced line-up, will have no "center." Herron, Strickland and Robertson, all rising to 6-6, are the tallest members of the squad, probably the shortest at Oregon in recent years.

But Kuykendall, a deadily outside shooter and two-year veteran, and Rask, the brilliant sophomore of a year ago, give the Ducks two of the best starting guards in the PCC. And Butch Kimpston, another of the Webfoot's highly-rated sophs, is expected to see his share of the action, too.

The Ducks follow the OSC game with two in McArthur Court against Brigham Young, then meet Wichita on Dec. 12, and Montana on Dec. 22 and 23. They close their pre-season schedule with participation in the All-College Tourney at Oklahoma City.

SL Hawks Widen Gap

Whether it's new coach Ed MacAuley, or just the old scoring punch of Bob Pettit, the St. Louis Hawks now are opening up a sizeable lead in the Western division of the National Basketball association.

The Hawks came through their fourth victory in five starts under MacAuley when the whipped the Syracuse Nats, 107-98, in St. Louis Thursday. And leading the way was Pettit with 42 points, one night after scoring 31.

With the other Western teams idle on the holiday, the Hawks now hold a three-game lead over second-place Detroit.

In the only other game played Thursday, the Boston Celtics led most of the way to beat the Philadelphia Warriors, 107-90, in Philadelphia, and now trail the Eastern division leading New York Knicks by just a game and a half. Bob Cousy led the Celts with 31 points while Woody Sauldsberry had 25 for the Warriors.

Miss Sou Leads For 10th Week

New York—UPI—Mississippi Southern today topped the United Press International small college football ratings for the 10th straight week.

The Board of Coaches which rates the nation's small colleges for UPI gave coach Thad (Pie) Vann's Mississippi Southern club 32 first-place votes and a total of 366 points.

The ballots were based on games played through last Saturday and did not include Thursday's clash between Mississippi Southern and seventh-ranked Chattanooga. After this week end's games, the coaches will cast their final 1958 ballots and select a national small college champion.

OTI Forfeiture Meet Subject

Portland—UPI—Coaches and athletic directors of the five Oregon Collegiate conference schools meet here Saturday with Oregon Tech's forfeiture of its 1958 OCC football title the top item on the agenda.

The Klamath Falls school announced last week it was forfeiting its claim to the title and to all OCC games because four players were found to be ineligible.

Other members of the conference are Oregon college of Monmouth, Eastern Oregon of La Grande, Southern Oregon of Ashland, and Portland State.

SO Against Expulsion
Eastern Oregon and Southern Oregon were against any move to possibly expel OTI as a result of the ineligibility. Arch Dunsmoore of EOC and Ted Schopf of SOC both said they would not favor such a move.

Portland State and Oregon college representatives indicated that they would reserve judgment until the facts are in.

The coaches and athletic directors will make recommendations to faculty representatives and school presidents who meet here Dec. 15 when final action will be taken.

Archers Can Hunt Deer Along Rogue in December

Portland—Oregon big game hunters holding special permits will get an additional crack at deer and elk with several short seasons on tap in late November and December. In addition, Oregon archers have one more area that will be open for deer hunting.

Hunters holding permits and unused deer tags for the McKenzie management unit will get their last chance at either-sex deer on Nov. 29 and 30. Both the unit permit and unused deer tag are required to be eligible for this hunt. Only a small portion of the McKenzie unit will be open, and permit holders are urged to consult the regulations for boundaries.

On those same dates, November 29 and 30, some 200 special tag holders will move into the Mill creek area near The Dalles for the opening of the controlled deer hunt in the Mill creek watershed. Tag holders may take one deer of either sex.

Nov. 29 and 30 will also see some 500 permit holders move into the Clatsop area for the controlled elk season in the agricultural areas of north Clatsop county. Hunters in this area will be allowed one elk of either sex but are restricted to hunting within one mile of established agricultural lands.

Two Mile Strip
The last two big game hunts for rifle hunters are controlled seasons on elk in the Shaw mountains out of North Powder and Bridge creek out of Ukiah. The Shaw mountain controlled hunt is scheduled for Dec. 6 through Jan. 31. A total of 300 special permits has been issued for this hunt with a bag limit of one elk. The Bridge creek hunt, with 150 permits issued, is set for Dec. 13 through Dec. 31. Bag limit for permit holders is one elk.

Archers will have a stretch along the Rogue river to hunt deer from Dec. 6 through Dec. 21. The area covers a swath
