## Big Game Cards To Be Turned In By Hunters

Portland—Oregon hunters are again reminded that the big game report card issued with big game tags should be returned immediately to the game commission following the close of the seasons.

The game commission points out that these cards are essential in determining the total state-wide harvest of big game animals. The cards also show the number of animals taken by sex. Such information is needed when considering future regulations and management of Oregon's big game herds. Accurate figures can be obtained only if all hunters cooperate in supplying the information needed.

Hunters who failed to bag an animal are also required to return the cards since it is just as important to know the number of hunters who were unsuccessful as it is those who were successful.

All hunters are required by law to return the report card within 30 days after the close of the hunting seasons. Failure to comply with this law could result in the hunter being refused a hunting license next year.

If the card has been lost or misplaced, a regular post card will do, containing the following information: the county in which the animal was killed, the nearest town or landmark, the animal's sex, and number of points on a side if the animal was a buck deer or bull elk.

## Coya Knutson Asks Investigation of Election Defeat

Washington —(UP)—Rep. Coya Knutson (D-Minn.) charged today that her defeat in the Nov. 4 elections was brought about by a "malicious conspiracy" which involved her husband. She asked a House investigation.

Mrs. Knutson, the only Democrat House member to be defeated by a Republican, came into the limelight earlier this year when her husband, Andrew, declared his opposition to her congressional career and launched a "Coya come home" campaign.

The blond Minnesota congresswoman told a crowded conference that "malicious" charges involving herself and her young secretary, William Kjeldahl, were spread by her husband as part of a campaign by persons "attached to and associated with" successful Republican candidate Odin Langen.

**Claims 'Fraud'**  
"The entire malicious campaign constituted a fraud on the voters," she said in a complaint to the special House committee investigating campaign expenditures. "Had such fraud not been perpetrated, the results of the voting would have been different."  
Langen defeated Mrs. Knutson in the election by 1,390

## Nixon Holds Own Under Ribbing of Oxford Students

London —(UP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon more than held his own today under the good natured ribbing of Oxford university students.

Nixon and his wife Pat drove the 60 miles from London this morning to visit with American and British students at one of the oldest universities in the world. It was their first trip away from London since they arrived Tuesday.

As the smiling, jovial Nixon obviously expected, the name of Gov.-elect Nelson Rockefeller of New York was as well known in the ivy-covered halls as in the United States.

There was a large banner outside the dining hall showing a cartoon of Nixon and Rockefeller climbing to the top of a crown worn by President Eisenhower. In large black letters were the words: "Is Rocky at the Top?"

**Free-Swinging**  
There was more to come in a free-swinging 15-minute question and answer session with several hundred students, many of them Americans.

One, obviously American, asked Nixon what he thought of the New York state election "in the light of the future of the Republican national leadership."

Nixon drew a roar of laughter when he replied that "I would say that I had a seat on the 50-yard line for the greatest show on earth and I happen to be seated next to the coach," he replied.

Nixon said jokingly, "we certainly could use one" when a British student asked whether he had come to Britain for "a loan."

**Power of Veto**  
One student wanted to know how Eisenhower could veto legislation now that the Democratic party controlled Congress.

"The new Congress will tend to spend more," Nixon replied. "They will support a more radical spending system. But the President still has the power of veto and I believe there will be enough votes to support him."

Another student asked Nixon how much power he held in the government.

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Rockefeller would make a splendid governor.

Then he drew applause by praising Rockefeller as "one of the best candidates ever seen in American public life," and a potential strong runner in the 1960 presidential campaign.

Nixon was in great form and the students appreciated it. There were comments such as "he was very smooth," and "that was an all-right job."

Most of the questioning was about the workings of the U.S. government and Nixon's role in it.

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## Pilots May Try To Break Ban On Strike Plans

Attorneys for American Airlines pilots were to go to court in New York today in an effort to break a federal ban on their strike plans. At the same time Eastern Airlines attorneys expected a decision by a Miami federal judge whether to issue an injunction against a striking engineers union.

**Would Broaden Tieup**  
Lifting of the federal injunction against American Airlines pilots would considerably broaden the national airline tieup this Thanksgiving week end. Trans World Airlines also is idled by a strike. Even if the federal court in Miami issues an injunction against striking Eastern Airlines engineers, a concurrent strike by machinists still would ground EAL planes.

Stewardesses also were on strike against Lake Central Airlines, a Midwest feeder route. The stewardesses' strike, the nation's first, failed to curtail runs as pilots crossed picket lines and male supervisory personnel replaced the girls.

**Injunction Obeyed**  
The Air Lines Pilots Association had scheduled a strike against American earlier this week but obeyed an injunction issued in New York by Federal Judge Frederick Van Pelt Bryan. The order was returnable in court today.

American's pilots have been working without a contract since August, 1957, and attempts to reach a new agreement have met with no success, despite the presence of federal mediators. The union represents almost 1,500 pilots at American.

**Famed Conductor Dies in Boston**  
Boston —(UP)—Arthur Rodzinski, who recently scored a brilliant musical triumph in Chicago to climax a career which gained him world fame, died Thursday of a heart ailment. He was 66.

The internationally known conductor, who died at Massachusetts General hospital, may have traded his life for a personal victory, according to his second wife, Halina.

She said Thursday night that Rodzinski "gave everything he had in Chicago. He was tremendous. The critics raved. There were standing ovations every time. But it finished him."

Born Jan. 2, 1892 in Spalato, Dalmatia, Rodzinski first gained attention while conducting in Poland. He was asked in 1926 to come to this country by Leopold Stokowski, to become assistant conductor of the Philadelphia orchestra. Later he became a naturalized citizen.

**Washington Death Toll Set at Three**

A two-car, head-on collision south of Connell early today brought Washington state's Thanksgiving holiday traffic toll to three.

Two persons were killed in the accident.

The Yakima office of the State Patrol identified the victims as Helen E. Wingett, 55, Oakland, Calif., and Edward K. Brown, 51, San Mateo, Calif.

The third traffic fatality since the count began at 6 p.m. Wednesday was Paul Arquette, 34, Wapato. He was fatally injured early Thursday.
