

Spite Seen in Move To Veto Washington State Bowl Request

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The man on the street feels there was some "spite" involved in UCLA and Southern California vetoing Washington State's plea for a chance to entertain a bowl bid, a poll disclosed Friday.

The United Press International conducted a survey of 20 persons picked at random on the street and asked them their opinions of the "veto" on permission to entertain a bowl bid. The overwhelming majority had no opinion. 15 persons saying they didn't know enough about the question to comment.

Those who agreed the "veto" was just felt it was proper retaliation by the schools which had been penalized by the conference for illegal aid to athletes.

"I think UCLA and SC are right because of the conference penalties," said service station attendant Larry Faver. "They're getting back at the Northwest the right way. I say do unto others as they do unto you."

remarked: "If I had the decision to make I would let them play a bowl game. What difference could it possibly make to the schools here if they did get a game?"

Olympia (UPI)—Gov. Albert D. Rosellini pleaded Friday for reconsideration by UCLA and Southern California of their veto of Washington State's post-season football bowl plans.

Rosellini wired California Gov. Goodwin Knight, asking him to use his influence "in the spirit of sportsmanship" to persuade UCLA and USC to withdraw their objections to WSC negotiation for a bowl bid.

The Cougars, with a 7-3 record, were edged by California for a trip to the Rose Bowl but were being considered for both the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans and the Gator Bowl at Jacksonville, Fla. They asked a waiver of a PCC rule prohibiting member schools from playing in any post-season game except the Rose Bowl.

But UCLA and USC, claiming the vote should only come up at a regular meeting of the

conference, invoked a clause requiring unanimous approval of all nine schools before a telegraphic vote can be taken.

Philadelphia (UPI)—Army spotted Navy a first period touchdown today and then went on to grind out a methodical 22-6 victory behind the brilliant running of Bob Anderson and a recovery fumble ability of Guard Bob Novogratz.

Anderson scored two of the three Army touchdowns and Novogratz recovered three fumbles in Army's march to victory. But Army's "lone end" Bill Carpenter left it up to his opposite end, Don Ustry, to put this game on ice.

As Carpenter deceived Ustry, who had caught five passes for 80 yards, intercepted a desperate Navy pass with only two minutes to go and ran across the goal line unimpeded for 38 yards to wrap it up for Army.

Three-Man Show
Before a crowd of 100,000 on a chilly but sunny day in Municipal stadium, Anderson, Novogratz and Ustry made it pretty much a three-man show. But until the Ustry interception in the closing mo-

Boulder, Colo. (UPI)—The undefeated Air Force Falcons made a great last-minute goal line stand to defeat Colorado Saturday, 20-14, and then voted to accept an invitation to play Texas Christian university in the Cotton Bowl.

In their first year of major college competition, the Falcons won nine games and were tied 13-13 by Iowa. Big Ten champion and Rose Bowl contender.
