Young Knight was an exchange student of Lewis and Clark college and attended school in Montpellier, France last year. He toured Europe, taking colored slides of all the countries. He showed pictures of Morocco, the world's fair in Brussels, and ended his program with slides of Lewis and Clark college in Portland.

The "arm chair tour" started from Gibraltar, as it is a stepping stone to North Africa. Morocco has every variety of climate, from the desert to the snowcapped Atlas mountains, the speaker said. The student told of Barbara Hutton's home in Tangier, which he states is truly magnificent.

He attended the first bull fight that had been held in many years as they had been outlawed. Not many people attended, he said.

Princess Lala Isha, eldest daughter of the Sultan, Mohamed, the fifth, is a liberal and progressive worker, the traveler said. She is working very hard for equalization of women's rights, so they can live the European way.
