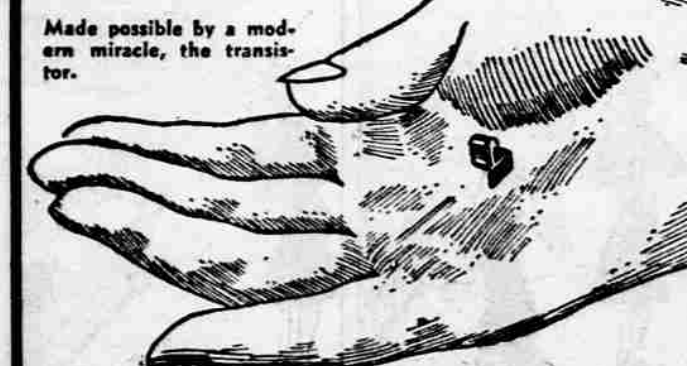

Beck's Airways Deal Disclosed

Tacoma, Wash.—UPI—Mrs. Virginia Evans was to be cross-examined by defense attorney Charles S. Burdell today in the income tax evasion trial of Dave Beck.

Beck, former president of the Teamsters Union, is charged with evading \$240,000 in income taxes during 1950-1953.

Mrs. Evans, who with her husband, Charles, operated the now defunct Golden North Airways, testified Monday that Beck invested \$27,500 in the line on Aug. 2, 1950, about a month before the firm's license was revoked by the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

Nine months after he made the investment, she said, he was paid \$52,500—a profit of \$25,000.

Mrs. Evans is a second cousin to Mrs. Norman Gessert, wife of Mrs. Beck's cousin. She said that after the license was revoked a tax problem arose and she went to Beck for advice.

"He told me not to worry about it," she said. "He said he had a great deal of experience with taxes and that he had lots of accountants. He said the Internal Revenue Bureau had been trying to pin something on him for a long time."

"He said 'I've never lost a night's sleep in my life over the Internal Revenue Bureau.'"

The Golden North Airways operated between Seattle and Fairbanks starting in 1947.

Bomb Threat Clears Reed Dormitory

Portland—UPI—Another telephone bomb threat cleared the Reed college dormitory dining room Monday afternoon.

The caller, who sounded young, told a police station switchboard operator that a dynamite bomb had been placed in the dining hall and was set to explode at 5 p.m. No bomb was found.

The latest threat came after the arrest last week of a 45-year-old former night watchman at the college, who admitted making at least three of the previous calls, saying college students had made fun of him.

Stocks Irregular On Profit-Taking

New York—UPI—Stocks turned irregular today after three sessions of advance.

Profit-taking brought declines of fractions to two points in some of the recent leaders on the upside, including steels, autos, metals, tobacco, rails and some electronics issues.

Meantime, traders turned to other sections of the list. Their buying brought good gains into the building equipment, selected electronics, selected tires, and special issues.

Losses in the metals ranged to more than two points in Magna. Oils for the most part were narrowly mixed with two of them—Gulf and Richmond—down a point or more. Illinois Central in the rails.

Passengers Accept New Fairchild F-27

Seattle—The Fairchild F-27 has had immediate passenger acceptance and its use in actual scheduled operations for the past two months has been reflected in the highest load factor in the company's history for this season of the year, West Coast Airlines has announced.

Initial flights by WCA of the high-wing 40-passenger transports last Sept. 28, marked the entry of the nation's local service airlines into the commercial jet age. West Coast was first to fly America's new twin-propjet airliner.

Company officials were enthusiastic about the success of the F-27 on West Coast's runs from Seattle into Idaho and from Seattle through Oregon to Klamath Falls.

On Monday, another F-27 was placed in operation, offering propjet service to other cities, including Spokane. Delivery of the last of six F-27s to West Coast's initial order is expected from the factory in Hagerstown, Md., by today or tomorrow.
