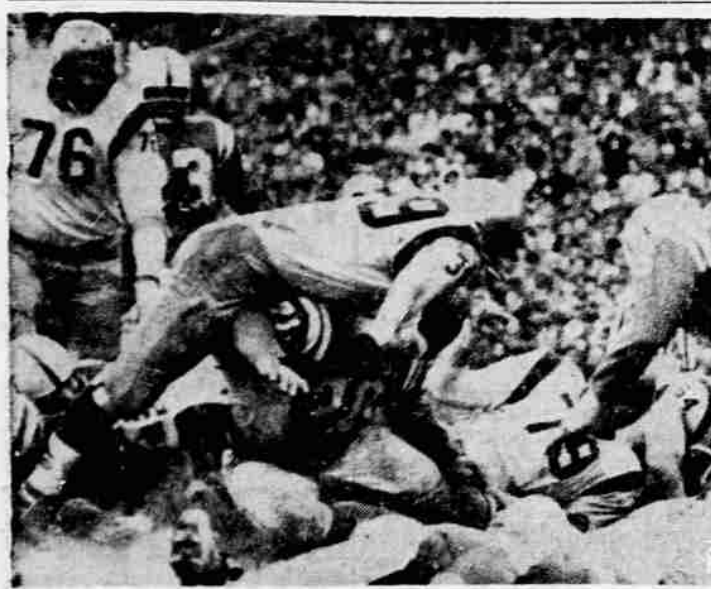

Eugene, Ore. — (UPI) — Coach Steve Belko of the University of Oregon basketball team can hardly be blamed if he is caught casting envious glances at the school's freshman team. The tall man Belko has so sorely needed since he took over here two seasons ago is a member of the frosh squad. The big guy is Glen Moore, a 6-8 all-star from Klamath Falls who led his team to the state prep title last year.

Belko has no one taller than 6-5 on his varsity which is the main reason the Webfoots are not being counted upon as title contenders in the last scheduled loop season of the Pacific Coast conference.

Layne Hops To Second In Passing

Philadelphia — (UPI) — Bobby Layne's jump into second place among the passers and the slowdown of Jimmy Brown of Cleveland among the rushers marked the weekly statistics of the National Football League today.

Layne, who now has piloted the Pittsburgh Steelers to five straight victories, was eighth among the passers two weeks ago. But the former Texas ace who came to the Steelers from the Detroit Lions now has bolstered his record to 8.41 yards for every pass thrown, and is close behind league leader Eddie LeBaron. LeBaron of the Washington Redskins has averaged a gain of 9.23 yards per pass.

Brown, held to 12 yards in 11 carries by the Redskins last Sunday, still is the No. 1 rusher with 1,241 yards, a margin of 556 yards over second place Alan Ameche of the Baltimore Colts. Brown is almost 100 yards ahead of Steve Van Buren's former record for ground gained in a single season.

Perry Moves Along
Joe Perry of San Francisco, another breaker of a long-time Van Buren record, is third with 680 yards, five behind Ameche. Perry now has a career record of 6,471 yards compared to Van Buren's old NFL mark of 5,860.

Tom (The Bomb) Track of Pittsburgh is fourth with 611 yards and Jon Arnett of the Los Angeles Rams is fifth with 569.

Milt Plum — of the Browns is in third place in the passing scramble with an 8.24 average with Johnny Unitas of the Colts fourth with 8.18 and Billy Wade of Los Angeles fifth with 8.13.

Wade and Unitas are tied in touchdowns passes, each with 15, while Wade leads the league in total yardage gained with 2,375.

Brown Slows
Brown, scoreless in his last two games, continues high scorer with 17 touchdowns and 78 points. Paige Cotren of Los Angeles is third with 68.

Pete Retzlaff of the Eagles and Ray Berry of the Colts were tied in pass receptions at 48 each, with Berry leading in touchdowns passes with eight. Del Shofner of Los Angeles was third with 44, but was high in total yardage with 875. He scored six touchdowns.

Sam Baker of Washington was the leading punter with a 45-6 yard average with Arnett the leader in punt returns with a 14.1 yard average. Len Lyles of Baltimore led in kickoff returns with a 37.6 yard average while Jim Patton of New York led the interceptors with eight, followed by Ray Brown and Andy Nelson, both of Baltimore, with eight each.

Oregon this season will have a "center" only twice each game at the opening and halftime tipoffs.

UPI Board Predicts Cincinnati Will Be National Champion

New York — (UPI) — The University of Cincinnati, with the envy of every college basketball coach in All-America Oscar Robertson, was the clear-cut choice of the United Press International Board of Coaches today to wind up the 1958-59 season as national champion.

Twenty-three of the 35 outstanding coaches who will rate the teams weekly for UPI made Coach George Smith's Bearcats their No. 1 pick to wind up on top this season. Cincinnati finished second to West Virginia in final 1957-58 ratings following a 24-2 regular season during which they won the Missouri Valley Conference championship.

Kansas State Second
Kansas State, which defeated Cincinnati, 83-80, last season in the second round of the NCAA tournament, was picked second in this year's pre-season sizeup of the coaches. Notre Dame was the No. 3 choice, while Kentucky, the defending NCAA champion, was fourth. Rounding out the top 10 in order were Michigan State, Washington,

West Virginia, Xavier (Ohio), Oklahoma State and St. John's (N.Y.).

If the coaches' forecasts are accurate, here is how the various conference champions will shape up at the close of the season:

Missouri Valley, Cincinnati; Big Eight, Kansas State; Southeastern, Kentucky; Big Ten, Michigan State; Pacific Coast, Washington; Southern, West Virginia; Atlantic Coast, Maryland; West Coast, St. Mary's; Southwest, Texas Christian; Skyline, Wyoming; and Ivy, Dartmouth.

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Harridge Resigns League Presidency

Washington — (UPI) — Bill Harridge submitted his resignation to become effective when they are prepared to name my successor.

The United Press International learned on good authority that Joe Cronin, general manager of the Boston Red Sox, was the leading candidate to succeed Harridge, who has served as president of the league since 1931.

Harridge said he was not resigning because of his health or because of any criticism of his office, but it was known that the American league for some time was thinking about

bringing in a younger man. Oscar Fraley of UPI predicted in May, 1957, that Harridge would be let out shortly and Cronin would succeed him.

Army Puts 3 on Look All-America

New York — (UPI) — Look Magazine today announced selection of a 22-member 1958 All-America college football squad, "each enjoying equal first-team status."

Army placed three men on the squad — guard Bob Novogratz and backs Bob Anderson and Pete Dawkins. This marked the first time that three players from the same team were picked on the squad since Notre Dame turned the trick in 1947 and in 1949, both years when an 11-man team was picked.

The squad was picked by a seven-man selection committee of the Football Writers association.
