Holiday Safety to Be Topic on Local Program Thursday

A special program on home and holiday safety will be presented at 5 o'clock Thursday afternoon over station KBES-TV by the Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health association.

Planned primarily for the benefit of parents of young children, the program will include suggestions on shopping for safe toys for Christmas, and dangers present in the home during the holiday season and throughout the year.

Appearing on the program will be Dr. Jack Ingram, physician specializing in diseases of the ear, nose and throat; Dr. H. L. Boehnke, pediatrician, and Medford Fire Chief Gordon Barker.

The U. S. public health service has pointed out that more than 6,000 children are killed annually by accidents which occur in the home, and about 750,000 are seriously injured. Because most of these accidents could be prevented and many of them happen during the holidays each year, the association felt such a program would be helpful and informative at this time.

Show Article Lodged

X-rays showing articles lodged in a child's lung, instruments used in removing such articles, as well as some articles which have been removed to save a child's life will be shown. Also shown will be various poisons most frequently taken by small children, and found in nearly every home. First aid measures will be explained, and "what to do" instructions given.

Fire hazards are present in almost every home, according to Chief Barker, and these too are increased during the Christmas season. Ways to prevent tragedies caused by fire will be discussed, and inflammable toys, gifts, and articles of clothing will be identified.

This will be the last medical panel to appear this year on the bi-weekly program presented by the association, in cooperation with the Jackson County Medical society. The program scheduled Dec. 18 will feature choral groups from the Medford schools.

Indians Protected On Mineral Leases

Washington — (UPI) — The Interior Department Tuesday amended the code of federal regulations to guarantee that Indian tribes will receive adequate offers for mineral leases on their lands.

The amendment provides greater uniformity in regulating the leasing of Indian lands for the mining of minerals other than oil and gas. It also furnishes a safe-guard pattern after that which applies to oil and gas. Oil and gas leases are required by law to be advertised, not negotiated.

The old regulation permitted tribes to negotiate lease of tribal lands for mining of minerals other than oil and gas, without advertising for bids. The new regulation specifies advertising must precede issuance of such a lease, except under unusual conditions which are covered by a provision authorizing the Indian Bureau to grant written permission to negotiate a lease.

Foreign Ministers To Meet in Paris

Washington — (UPI) — American officials said Tuesday night the Western Big Three foreign ministers would meet in Paris Dec. 14-15 on the Berlin situation.

The United States, Britain and France plan to reject Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's demand for neutralization of Berlin, these officials said, and counter with a call for Russia to join in a Big Four conference on the broad question of European security.

Such a conference also would include the question of German reunification. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who proposed the Paris foreign ministers meeting, was said to be confident the 15-nation NATO council would endorse the counter proposal.

Governor Suggests Processing System

Salem — (UPI) — A study aimed at developing an electronic data processing system for Oregon state government was recommended today by Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

Holmes said his recommendation was based on a survey just completed for the state by the management consulting firm of Booz, Allen and Hamilton which estimated the state could save from \$500,000 to one million dollars a year after an installation cost of about \$550,000.

Major uses for the data processing equipment would be for motor vehicle registration and driver's licensing, engineering calculations and highway statistics, public welfare payments and accounting, state employee and unemployment compensation records, taxpayers accounts and truck registrations.
