## FBI Called in To Help Establish Identity of Twins

Shreveport, La. — FBI — A young Air Force couple who called in the FBI to determine which of their twin daughters was which say the girls themselves intentionally cause most of the mix-ups between them.

"If one does anything naughty, they always say it was the other one," explained Mrs. Earl Wolfe, wife of a 30-year-old lieutenant and a mother of a high-spirited pair of five-year-old sandy-haired twins named Margie and Michelle.

Faced with the prospect of enrolling the girls in kindergarten, the Wolfes decided to find out if they had been successful in their various methods for telling the twins apart. A test of fingerprints confirmed by the FBI showed they were right.

Mrs. Wolfe a chic New Englander who came here when her husband was transferred to Barksdale Air Force Base, said that by various devices she has always been able to tell the twins apart.

Wanted Confirmation  
She said she and her husband "merely wanted confirmation" now that the girls were about to enter world of red tape.

However, Mrs. Wolfe admitted one of the twins has sometimes been fed twice, and her husband laughingly confessed that "more than once one of them has gotten a whipping intended for the other."

Mrs. Wolfe says that when the twins were born in an Air Force hospital, officials tagged Michelle "Wolfe A" because she was born four minutes before her sister. Little Margie was tagged "Wolfe B."

Later, the impersonal "A" and "B" were replaced by silver bracelets, which the Wolfes used until their daughters' wrists became too chubby.

Later, Margie grew a mole on her forehead and this offer-

ed a simple means of identification. But Michelle soon grew one in the same spot. Margie was the first to cut a tooth and this too provided an easy way to tell who was who—until Michelle came up with a tooth of her own.

**Weight Advantage**  
Mrs. Wolfe said the surest means of telling the twins apart has been the slight weight advantage which Michelle has maintained since birth. She weighed five pounds, 12½ ounces, compared with Margie's five pounds, 2½ ounces.

Margie and Michelle have a long and amusing history of problems growing out of the fact they're twins. Mrs. Wolfe said that at a nursery at Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, Tex., the attendants requested that the twins be dressed in differently colored socks.

"But they couldn't remember which one had the blue socks and which wore white one," Mrs. Wolfe chuckled. "We couldn't remember either; we just resorted to the old weight difference to solve the dilemma."

Wolfe, a KC-97 (re-fueling plane) pilot recalled that shortly after the twins were born a baby sitter who couldn't resist playing with the tots ("most of them can't") upset the household by putting Michelle back into the crib designed for Margie and Margie and in Michelle's bed. It wasn't until the next morning that the parents realized the switch.

The Wolfes first contacted local police to make new footprints of the twins to match those taken at their birth.

The police department put two detectives on the case. Two local FBI men were called in. A double-check in Washington confirmed findings of which twin belonged to which footprint.

Case closed.

## Neuberger Disturbed By Canadian Delay In Engineering Study

New York—Democratic Sen. Richard Neuberger of Oregon said today he was concerned that Canada may extend the existing stalemate on Columbia river power.

Neuberger told United Press International from his home in Portland that he was "not pleased by reports that there will be an additional delay in announcement of results from the Canadian engineering studies."

He said, "The absence of precise and detailed factual information about Canada's hopes and plans is a major factor in the lack of progress toward settlement of some international policies concerning the boundary waters. The desire of Canadians to have their plans rest on a sound engineering basis is certainly understandable, but I hope that there will not be further delay which could extend the existing stalemate."

**Senator 'Heartened'**  
Neuberger, who is perhaps the most persistent advocate in Congress of swift settlements on all hydroelectric power disputes with Canada, also said he was "heartened to hear that the government of Canada seems to be skeptical of the vast Wenner-Gren proposal to spend \$600 million tapping the power resources

of the rushing Peace river."

"If the Peace is developed," he continued, "it may be another 20 years before British Columbia can absorb the immense power potential of the upper Columbia. And on the Columbia rests the hope of the Pacific Northwest for an agreement with Canada which might result in storage that would increase the production at Grand Coulee, McNary, Bonneville and other dams in the United States. Furthermore, the Wenner-Gren project on the Peace would be much farther in transmission distance than the Columbia from the booming Vancouver industrial area, where most of the power must be used."

**Destiny on Columbia**  
Neuberger added that "storage areas like Lica Creek and Arrow Lakes in British Columbia would add to the generating capacity of every project downstream on the other side of the international border. That is why our destiny is on the Columbia and not the distant Peace."

The senator also said he agreed with a recent article by the well-known Canadian editor Bruce Hutchinson which concluded that Canadian Gen. A. G. McNaughton's cherished Fraser river tunnel diversion plan would repeat on a vast scale the disaster caused by the Hell's Gate rock slide in 1912. It took 30 years of patient work by Canada and the United States to repair the damage and restore the salmon industry, according to Hutchinson.

"I agree," said Neuberger, "with Mr. Hutchinson's con-

clusion that the loss of the salmon industry is too high a price to pay for additional power as long as alternative sources of hydro-power are available. Public opinion is opposed to dooming this fishery and I believe that is the important factor in sealing the fate of Fraser diversion."
