## Episcopal Bishop Of Oregon Here For Sunday Event

The Right Rev. James W. F. Carman D.D., Bishop of Oregon, will visit St. Mark's Episcopal church Sunday to administer the rite of holy confirmation to a class of 35 adults and young people.

This will be the Bishop's first visitation to St. Mark's since becoming Diocesan last August on the retirement of the Right Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell. The class to be presented has been under preparation for the past three months by the rector, the Rev. George R. V. Bolster; the Rev. John S. Power, Mrs. G. W. Allingham, and Robert S. Rix.

The confirmation service will be held at 11 a.m. with a reception following in the church marked for the candidates and their families and friends.

The Bishop will also preach at the church school family service at 9:30 a.m. and will be present at the Men's Advent corporate communion at 8 a.m. when the corporate offering of the men will be devoted to extending the work of the church on college campuses. All confirmed men and boys are invited to attend this service, and those not yet confirmed are to present their offerings at one or other of the later services.

The junior members of the confirmation class will be the guests of St. Mark's Young People's Fellowship on Sunday at 7:15 p.m. in the church annex where they will attend an exhibition of "mystery and magic" by George Pierce, magician and illusionist.

The church property, which includes the church building and various small buildings, were purchased and built over a period of years starting in the early 1900s.

The primary department building was the former parsonage for the church. The first Zion Lutheran church on the site was built in 1897 and in 1927 was moved to the corner of Haven and Holly sts. where it is now the First Church of God.

Workmen tearing down the Sunday school building discovered the old type of square nails in some parts of the structure and found postcards and newspapers in the walls dating to pre-World War I days.

## Eastern Orthodox Church Listed as Major Religion

It comes natural to most people to speak of "the three great religions," Protestants, Roman Catholics and Jews.

This national habit is a source of considerable irritation to some 5,000,000 Americans who are members of the Eastern Orthodox churches.

They believe that Eastern Orthodoxy is entitled to public recognition as a fourth major confession. Slowly but steadily, they seem to be getting their point across.

The U.S. armed forces now use the letter "EO" on dog tags to identify Eastern Orthodox Christians, who were previously lumped in with Protestants. President Eisenhower invited an orthodox priest to offer one of the four prayers at his second inaugural.

The legislatures of 17 states have enacted resolutions officially recognizing Orthodoxy as a fourth major faith. Similar legislation is pending in other states and will be introduced in the U.S. Congress next January.

Not Pride To Orthodox Christians, this is not just a matter of pride, but of bringing popular usage into line with the facts of history.

For the first thousand years of its existence, the Christian church was undivided. But friction developed between its two main centers of ecclesiastical power—Constantinople in the East and Rome in the West. The patriarch of Constantinople, and the Greek-speaking Eastern churches which followed his leadership, refused to acknowledge the claims of the Pope of Rome for supremacy over the entire church.

In 1054, the estrangement was formalized by what historians call "the great schism." The Roman Pope excommunicated the patriarch of Constantinople, and the patriarch excommunicated the Pope. The Latin speaking Western churches remained under the Pope, and became what is called today the Roman Catholic church. The Eastern churches became the Orthodox communion.

Orthodox Christians say they did not split off from Rome—Rome split off from them. Their churches claim to be the "direct heirs and true conservators" of the original Christian faith as it was spelled out at the seven great councils of the primitive church.

Recite Nicene Creed The familiar Nicene creed, formulated at the Council of Nicene in 325 A.D., is one of the fullest expressions of Orthodox doctrine, and is recited at each liturgy.

Orthodox worship is elaborately ritualistic. The church recognizes seven sacraments: Baptism which is administered to infants and adults by triple immersion; Anointing or confirmation, which immediately follows Baptism; Penance; Communion; Holy Orders; Marriage; and Holy Unction which is administered to the sick, but not necessarily as a last rite.

Candidates for the priesthood may marry before they are ordained, but not afterwards. All Orthodox bishops are members of a monastic order which practices celibacy.

Orthodox churches have never been governed by a single head. Since the time of the great schism, the patriarch of Constantinople has shared ecclesiastical authority with four other patriarchs of major Eastern cities.

Eastern Orthodoxy has tended to divide into independent, self-governing national churches, which have remained in full communion with one another. The largest national churches grow up in the Middle East and the Slavic countries, notably Greece, Russia, Bulgaria, Romania and Albania.

The first Orthodox church on American soil was built by Russian monks at Kodiak, Alaska, in 1792. The Russian missionaries won many converts among Eskimos, and built a cathedral at Sitka, before Alaska passed into U.S. hands.

## Christmas Carols Set For Residential Areas

Christmas carols will be heard in the residential areas of Medford next week as members of the local Seventh-day Adventist churches begin their annual World Missions Appeal.

For 55 years church members have been once yearly inviting friends and neighbors to participate in their world mission and welfare program which has grown from a small beginning to a value of \$24,562,401 in 1957. This figure includes hours of volunteer services, articles of clothing, and food baskets in addition to cash used during the year.

Volunteer workers will call at doors in Medford for the next three weeks to the accompaniment of the traditional Christmas hymns. According to Lewis Corwin, Home Missionary leader of the Medford church, although there will be some personal caroling, carolite machines will largely be used to facilitate a better quality of music over a longer period of time. The machines were used last year with good success, and enabled workers to cover a much larger territory in the annual appeal.

The church operates a welfare center locally behind the Medford Seventh-day Adventist church building located on the corner of Edwards and Beatty sts. According to Mrs. A. J. Miracle, co-director, a total of 781 persons in this area have been given aid during the past year. In addition to the local help, many articles of clothing were shipped to the large supply depot at Watsonville, Calif., for distribution to disaster areas throughout the world.

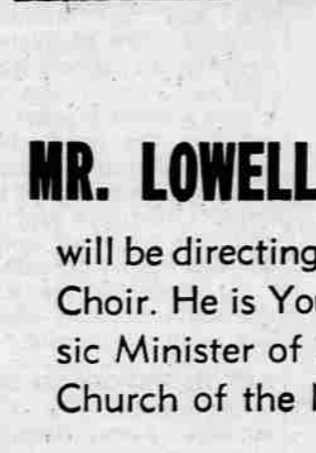
