The building's exterior is to be yellow stucco with aluminum windows, Elmore said. Off-street parking for approximately 100 cars is to be provided.

Ashland in Favorable Position Against Smog

Ashland — Bob Church, weather bureau meteorologist at Medford, told Ashland Rotarians last week that Ashland is in a favorable position to have less air pollution and smog because of its altitude.

He noted that the air pollution and smog situation in the Rogue valley will become more serious as the population increases. He added, however, that Ashland is about 1,160 feet higher than the Rogue river.

As a result, Church said, there is a bowl in which fog, smoke and fumes are trapped when there is an inversion of normal temperatures. Temperatures during fog conditions

show readings of about 30 on the ground and 60 about 2,000 feet, which is the reverse of normal conditions.

The altitude of Ashland helps the local area have a warmer, cleaner air, he added, than points lower in the valley when the inversion condition prevails.

Church said satellites would play an invaluable role in determining atmospheric conditions and their effect on the world's weather in the future. He said automatic weather stations which will transmit information to central bureaus also are being developed. There is now one on Sexton mountain, north of Grants Pass.
