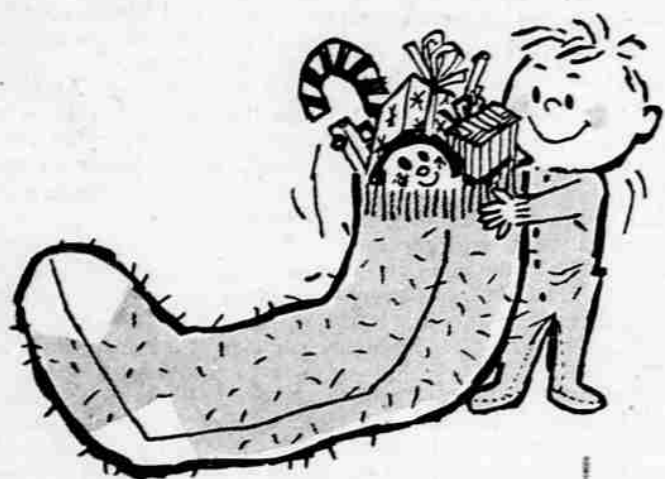


Flamingoes feed with their heads turned upside down, according to the National Geographic Magazine.

Last month's total is an increase of 885 more than the number visiting the museum during November, 1957, when 1,489 persons registered. Total number of visitors since the museum opened July 10, 1950, is 311,706.
