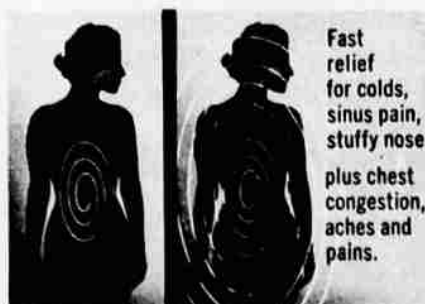

They Went That-a-Way

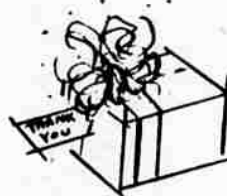
