Washington, D. C.—Election of Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, wife of Oregon Senator Richard L. Neuberger, to a position on the board of directors of the American Association for the United Nations was announced today.

Mrs. Neuberger was named to a four-year term on the board of the association, whose officers include Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt and Palmer Hoyt, publisher of The Denver Post and former publisher of The Oregonian. Other members of the board include former Senator Herbert Lehman of New York, Paul G. Hoffman, Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, John R. Boettiger, Mrs. Eugene Lord Anderson and Anna Lord Strauss.

The association is affiliated with the World Federation of United Nations Associations. Mrs. Neuberger explained, and its program is devoted to attainment of world peace through the work of the United Nations organization. As a member of the board of directors, Mrs. Neuberger will help determine policies to promote public knowledge and understanding of the United Nations.

Mrs. Neuberger has been invited to attend the meeting of the board scheduled for January 28 in New York City. The Neuberger has had a long interest in progress of the United Nations. While in Army service during World War II, Neuberger attended the 1945 UN Charter Conference in San Francisco as an official observer. Mrs. Neuberger has addressed a number of women's organizations on UN programs to improve world health and education and raise the status of women in under-developed countries.

**For Calorie Counters**
