

# Arch Moore Seeks KO Mark In Title Ring Bout Tonight

Montreal—(UPI)—Facts and figures on tonight's Archie Moore-Yvon Durelle title fight: Principles: Champion Archie Moore of San Diego, Calif., vs. Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., British Empire and Canadian champion.

Title at stake: Moore's world light-heavyweight championship.

Place: Montreal, Forum.

Distance: 15 rounds.

Promoter: Eddie Quinn.

Betting: Moore favored at 13-5.

Expected crowd: 11,000.

Expected gate: \$125,000.

Starting time: 10 p.m. e.s.t.

Television: By ABC in United States; by CBS in Canada, with blackout in province of Quebec.

Radio: None.

Television money: \$75,000 for U.S., undisclosed sum for Canada.

Fighters' purses: Moore guaranteed \$75,000, with privilege of 40 per cent of all net receipts. Durelle guaranteed \$12,000 with privilege of 20 per cent.

Return bout contract: If Durelle wins, must give Moore title shot within 90 days, somewhere outside Canada, with percentages 30-30.

Scoring: By three judges on five-point basis. Referee has no vote.

Despite his age and his 23 years in the ring, Moore of San Diego, Calif., is favored because of his punch and his ringcraft. He is a deadly hitter who scored 126 knockouts while winning 174 of his 204 bouts. That 126 tied him with the late W. L. Young Stribling for the most knockouts registered during any fighter's career in ring history. Another knockout tonight would make Archie the all-time kayo king.

Durelle Dangerous Sluggier

Moore is also smart defensively. He protects himself with a barricade of arms and elbows as he stalks an oppon-

ent about the ring, trying to force an opening.

Durelle is an awkward but dangerous slugger who scored 39 kayoes while winning 76 of his 98 bouts. He usually marches in with a wild hooking attack and keeps throwing leather until someone hits the deck. Both Yvon and Archie have been stopped six times each.

Moore is defending the title he won on Dec. 17, 1952 by outpointing Joey Maxim at St. Louis. He defended twice against Maxim and once each against Harold Johnson, Bobo Olson, Yolande Pompey and Tony Anthony.

# Harlem Stars Give Hilarious Evening

Clown Prince Goose Tatum led his highly regarded Harlem Stars to a hilarious 80-46 victory over the outgunned Hawkinson Tire Tread hoopers in the Hedrick junior high gym last night.

Tatum's clowning antics had not only the crowd laughing and cheering, but it kept the Hawkinson boys in continual spasms of laughter.

Hawkinson players put up a game fight but their shortage of height and evident inability to hit the bucket kept them well behind the more experienced Stars.

Behind the back passes and clever ball handling of all the Stars accounted for many of the points as the visitors of world wide fame jumped off to a 29-16 first quarter lead

and then to a 41-26 intermission bulge.

Ward Brings Cheers

Problems got more complicated for the home town hoopers as the dribbling of Tiny Ward added to the troubles of the Hawkinson team. Ward fought off a three and four man press with his one-man tactics in a crowd-cheering exhibition of dribbling.

Tatum and his whole squad were continually giving the two officials, Chuck Crandall and Cy Perkins, trouble whether it was over kicked basketballs or crying for more shots than the foul was worth no matter how many times the victim was fouled.

Time was halted when the "Prince" appeared to be thirsty and a dipper and bucket was brought from the bench. An argument ensued and Tatum was splattered by the dipper and in turn took after the villain with the bucket only to leave a mound of paper into the panicking front rows of the audience.

Shades of riotous college days were evident when Tatum apparently captured from the crowd a conspicuous pair of ladies pink panties near the closing minutes of the fourth quarter after the Stars had led 63-33 as the final stanza opened.

Injury Ruse

Apparent despair reigned in the Star squad when Tatum was fouled and his shoulder was thought to be affected but after a trip to the bench everything appeared to be under control.

The injury proved to be a ruse when Tatum had merely gone over to get another ball with a rubber band attached which raised havoc in the free throw lane.

Tatum capped the evening's scoring in the final second of play when he dunked the ball from his perch position atop Ward's shoulders.

Big Sweetwater Clifton headed the evening scoring with 34 points while Tatum had 23, Ward 12, Ramon Wilkinson five and Buckner six.

High man for the Hawkinson five was Derald Wootton with seven with Doug Witte and Ron Perry getting six each, Don Harris four, Willard Lilly two, Dick Niles three, Darry Johnson four, Dale McCay two, Bob Plankenhorn four, Fred Johnson three, and Bob Serak five.

# Riddle Five Subdues IV

Cave Junction-Riddle high, using a full court press defense all the way, downed Illinois Valley 49 to 28 in a non-league hoop tangle.

# Grade Gift Toss Tournament Set By Oregon State

Oregon State College, Corvallis—The first annual state of Oregon grade school free throw championships will be staged at Gill Coliseum on February 28, sponsored jointly by the state Elks association and the OSC athletic department, athletic director R. S. (Spec) Keane has announced.

A trip with the OSC basketball team to California in March on an all-expense-paid trip, in addition to a first place trophy, will go to the eventual winner of the tourney. He will sit on the Beaver bench at Palo Alto and Berkeley and serve as assistant hoop manager.

Trophies also will be given to the second, third and fourth place winners. Thirty-six various county winners will first vie on Saturday, February 28, in an afternoon session at the Coliseum. The top four will advance to the evening finals, at halftime of the OSC-Idaho game.

75 Throws

Champion will be chosen on the basis of 50 throws in the afternoon and 25 that evening. County championships will be organized and conducted by individual Elks lodges in every county of Oregon. A member of the local lodge will escort his county champion to Corvallis, and the Corvallis lodge will serve as hosts to the youngsters while they are in Corvallis.

A committee of three has been chosen to handle the state-wide contest. It includes Jack Zimbrick of Lebanon, chairman of the inter-lodge activities of the State Elks association; Rex Smith, representing the host Corvallis Elks lodge; and Jim Barratt, business manager of athletics at OSC.

Participants will be allowed to shoot their free throws in any way they choose, providing of course, they are at the proper distance. Students must be in grade school, not past the eighth grade.

# Turkey Shoot Here on Sunday

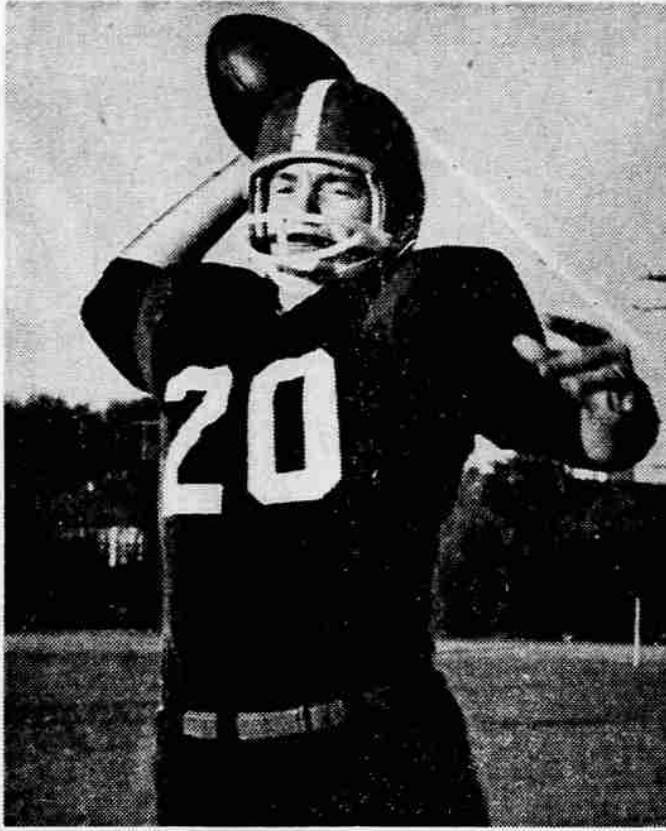

# Mont Quits Maryland

College Park, Md.—(UPI)—Earle Edwards and Gomer Jones were regarded as the leading candidates today to succeed Tommy Mont as head football coach at the University of Maryland.

Mont turned in his resignation to the Maryland board of regents Tuesday.

The Terrapins, former national champions, won only 11 games in three seasons under Mont's direction. He succeeded Jim Tatum as head coach in 1956.

Edwards currently is head coach at North Carolina State while Jones is line coach at Oklahoma, Jack Hennemer, a member of the present Maryland coaching staff, also is being considered for the head coach spot, according to informed sources.

# California Tips Gaels

The only way to beat the University of California basketball team is to break through its defenses—but even 11th ranked St. Mary's couldn't quite make it Tuesday night.

The Bears chalked up their fourth straight win of the season by edging the Gaels, 57-55, before a crowd of 7,200 at Berkeley. It was the first defeat for St. Mary's in four games.

Tonight the University of San Francisco Dons hope to come up with a winning combination when they host Texas A & M Christian university. The Dons have beaten Chico State and dropped close games to Seattle and California.

Other games tonight: Pepperdine vs. Seattle, San Diego State vs. Loyola, Long Beach vs. Nevada, Whitman vs. Gonzaga and Pacific Lutheran vs. Portland university.

California almost blew a comfortable lead over St. Mary's. The Bears were ahead, 56-43, with just seven minutes remaining when the Gaels started to roll.

The Gaels closed the gap to two points and then missed with a series of desperation shots in the final seconds.

LaRoy Doss of St. Mary's was high point man with 18, while guard Denny Fitzpatrick led the Bears with 16.

# Centennial Year Regatta Planned

Oregon State College—The Oregon State College rowing team will represent the state of Oregon and be host school in June for a special Centennial Year regatta that will include crews from seven West Coast schools.

The race, scheduled for June 13, will be one of the top crew events of 1959. It will be run on the Columbia river estuary adjacent to the main Centennial exposition area, under sponsorship of the state Centennial committee.

Crews invited to race with OSC include University of Washington, California, University of British Columbia, Stanford, UCLA, and University of Southern California.
