Parks, Recreation Commission Discusses Director's Salary

Medford's parks and recreation commission last night discussed wages for a parks and recreation director.

The seven members present heard Dr. Lynn Rodney, chairman of University of Oregon's recreation and outdoor education curriculum state that hiring a director should be given top priority.

Dr. Rodney also discussed a possible design study for the proposed swimming pool and park in the Jackson County Housing authority area by a team from the university.

New York—(UPI)—Stocks set out with great confidence to penetrate the recent record highs in an active market today and then stopped short when that objective was approached.

Profit-taking reduced prices all around but many issues held gains that ranged to more than a point in the main list and to more than three points in the special issues.

Today's resistance to the upturn was seen as a normal procedure in view of the sharp advance Wednesday. Chemicals stood out with DuPont at its best showing a rise of four points.

International Telephone which voted a 2-for-1 stock split and raised the dividend, ran up more than 4 points to a new high. Kroger, a 3-for-1 split issue, gained 3 1/2 to a new high and then fell back two points from the high.

Interview Directors

"I think at the present time," he said, "your most important need is to look over and interview prospective directors of parks."

With respect to wages, he said, "You're almost going to have to start at the \$590 scale, \$590 and up."

At this monthly rate, the minimum annual wage would be \$7,080. Dr. Rodney pointed out that the average in other Oregon cities run between \$7,400 and \$7,800. But in Klamath Falls, he said, the rate is \$6,300.

"The very least," he stated later, "would be something like \$6,500" for Medford. This rate might attract a director from a smaller town or someone fresh from university study," he said.

"They won't work for less," commented City Manager Robert A. Duff. Of the \$7,080 minimum rate, he said, "That would be our top engineer's salary."

Principal Item
"One of the principal things is how we are going to fit this in with the scale of others," Duff said.

The minimum rate recommended by Dr. Rodney would be on a par with the maximum salaries now paid the chiefs of fire and police. It would be comparable to that of a junior high school principal.

While the park directorship is considered a professional post, \$7,080 would exceed the present city attorney's salary too.

"I would like to make some studies," Duff said. Legal counsel would be necessary, he added, since this position would be in a new classification.

Applications Received
Duff mentioned that he has already received a number of applications. But a decision on wages would necessarily preclude their serious consideration.

Duff affirmed that he could give a report within two or from the commission was appointed to consider the matter also. Its membership includes Mrs. Edith Eden, chairman, Miss Colleen Hope and Veri G. Walker.

Dr. Rodney cited as desirable qualities in a parks director were imagination, energy and a sense of public relations.

Inspection of Site
On the subject of the proposed pool and park in the housing authority area, Dr. Rodney said he could arrange for an afternoon inspection of the site. He said Don Van Rossum, U. of O. swimming coach, and someone from the school of landscape architecture could look over the area and give an estimate of the cost for a design study.

This study, he said, would give a general layout for the area, relating the pool to other features such as landscaping. These features could be contributed by civic groups he said.

Dr. Rodney said he hoped the pool and bathhouse could serve as a community center and dance facility as well.

"These services," he said referring to the study, "have been on a cost basis. It's not as if someone from the University of Oregon was coming here to make a big, fat profit for himself."

No Date Set
An estimated \$75,000 along with land near Jackson school is to be turned over to the city by the housing authority on its dissolution, earmarked for the pool. No date for the actual transfer of funds has been set.

But Duff said, "It will be available in time to construct the pool this year."

"The thought of the housing authority," said Duff, himself a member, "is that its money would go to the pool while the city developed the park."

He said some of the housing authority's land would go to Jackson school for expansion of its facilities.
