

Injured Boy Scout Remains Critical

Portland —(UPI)—Lawrence Arnason, 14-year-old Boy Scout injured by a falling tree near Brightwood on Mt. Hood last Saturday, remained on the critical list in a local hospital.

Attendants said the boy, who suffered a head injury, still was being kept in a refrigerated sleeping bag which has reduced his body temperature 10 degrees. The temperature reduction is meant to reduce swelling in hope of preventing brain damage, his doctor said.

Gale G. — My husband and I have been married eight years and are fairly happy except for one thing that has always caused fights between us. He will never defend me or show any loyalty when I am in conflict with anyone else.

I don't know why it is, but whenever I go to parties I get into spats, political and otherwise, with other people. Even when he happens to know that I'm right my husband won't come to my aid.
