I suppose you have noticed the prominence of Senator Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota in the news of late.

Among other things, he has been in Russia. Not only has he been in Russia. He has been in Moscow. Not only has he been in Moscow. He has been in the Kremlin.

And—
Not only has he been in the Kremlin. He has been in Khrushchev's office in the Kremlin. And while in Khrushchev's office he has been TALKING TO KHRUSHCHEV — which is all to the good. When you get a chance to talk to your enemy, TALK TO HIM. Size him up. Spot his strong points and his weak points. Keep him talking as much as possible and do as little talking yourself as you can manage.

One can't know too much about one's enemies.

IT'S a safe bet in these talks Khrushchev had it in mind to take Senator Humphrey for a ride, if possible—as his predecessor Stalin was fond of doing with our people who tried to use an interview with him as a publicity stunt.

But—
There is some doubt as to whether he got away with it. Senator Humphrey is just back in Washington, and the first thing he did was to report to President Eisenhower on his Kremlin talks. His report, as briefed for us by the Washington correspondents, appears to have been realistic.

FOR example:
Mr. K confided to Senator H a SECRET MESSAGE on the Berlin crisis. Senator H gave the message to President Eisenhower, but when interviewed after his visit with the President he told the reporters he believes the Khrushchev proposals are "unacceptable."

Mr. K gave Senator H an earful on the subject of weapons and nuclear matters — which Senator H relayed to the President with the cautious addition that what Mr. K told him was "not as significant as Mr. Khrushchev would like to have us believe."

All in all, the senator from Minnesota seems to have acquitted himself rather well in this whole Russian adventure.

WHY all this palaver about Senator Humphrey?
Well, it fits in rather interestingly with an interview given early in the week by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt in Washington. In it, she summed up her opinion of three possible Democratic Presidential candidates. In her sum-up, as in Leigh Hunt's poem about Abou Ben Adhem, the name of Senator Humphrey led all the rest.

He comes closest, FDR's widow said, to "having the spark of greatness needed in the White House."

MRS. Roosevelt sized up Senator John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts as "understanding courage, but not possessing the independence to HAVE courage."

She disposed of Adlai Stevenson as being the "best we could have," but as being handicapped by his defeats in 1952 and 1956.

WHY is Mrs. Roosevelt's opinion interesting?

The answer is that it coincides with Mr. Khrushchev's. When Mr. K spent eight hours in his Kremlin office with Senator Humphrey, it wasn't just accidental.

He too sizes up the senator from Minnesota as Presidential timber.

Fish Commission Adopts Shrimp Rule

Portland — UP — The Oregon Fish Commission Wednesday adopted a regulation allowing commercial ocean shrimp fishermen to keep an incidental catch of not more than 3000 pounds of bottom fish in any one trip for shrimp.

Action on the question of whether to order a closed season on shrimp until next fall was deferred.

The Commission retained the present closed season on petrale sole in Oregon waters of the Pacific, from Dec. 20 to April 15.

No action was taken on a proposal that its seal hunter, William Puustinen, be permitted to use bombs in killing Columbia river seals.

To preserve the present sizes of golf courses, a research organization has been commissioned to develop a ball which will limit the drives of an expert without handicapping the average player.

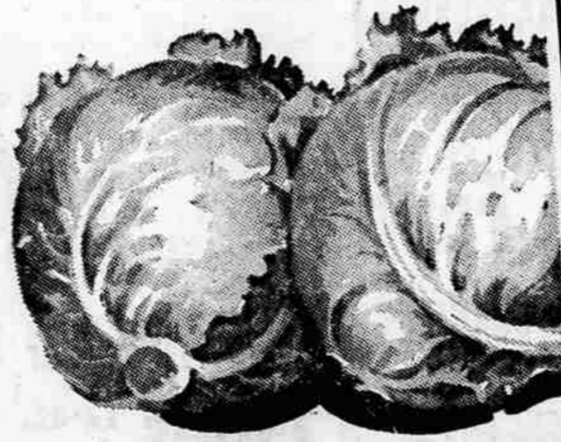
