

Williams Gets Sixth A.L. Batting Title

Chicago—UPI—Ted Williams, probably off fishing somewhere, was officially credited Saturday with hooking in the sixth American League batting title of his colorful career.

The 40-year-old Red Sox slugger, who spends most of the off-season angling for bone fish in the Florida Keys, took top batting honors this year

with a .328 average, according to official figures released by the American League.

Williams' title-winning mark was 60 points off his championship average of 1957 and the lowest he has compiled since 1951 when he hit .318. To win the crown for the sixth time, Williams had to come from behind in the final phase of the campaign and beat out teammate Pete Runnels.

Runnels finished second in the batting race with .322 and he was followed by Harvey Kuenn of the Tigers, .319; Al Kaline, also of the Tigers, .313, and Vic Power of the Indians, .312.

Jackie Jensen of Boston, winner of the most valuable player award, drove in the most runs in the circuit, 122, while batting .286. Rocky Colavito of the Indians was second with 133 RBIs; Roy Sievers of the Senators third with 108, and Bob Cerv of the Athletics fourth with 104.

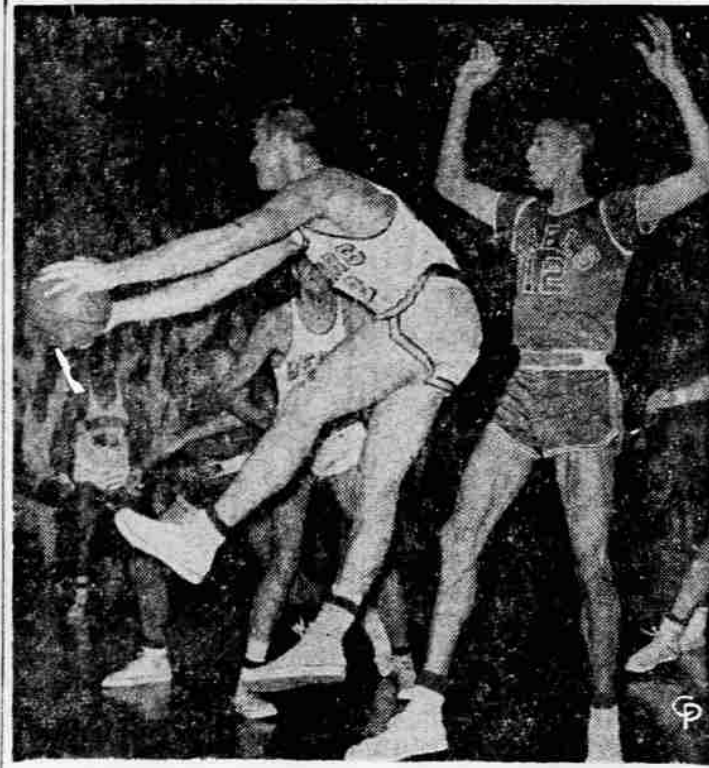

Hustle was an asset for the SM Crusaders in a rough conflict in which 45 fouls were tumbled. Period margins for St. Mary's were 14 to 7, 31 to 15 and 41 to 22. Bob Evans led Crusader scoring with 19 points and Floyd Scaife had 18 for the Cougars.

Seaver High Man Jacksonville had intermission advantages of 10 to 6, 22 to 13 and 27 to 23. Eddie Seaver of Talent was high scorer with 14 while Ken Perreard had 11 and Doyle Branson 10 for Jacksonville.

St. Mary's nosed Prospect 41 to 40 in its junior varsity game and Talent took its jayvee action by three points.

The Crusader varsity lost Florian Shasky, its top rebounder, Thursday evening when the knee he had surgery on last spring started hemorrhaging. He was hospitalized over the week end. Shasky may be back with the club near the end of the season.

Lubanski, Grubic Capture Bowling Championships

Chicago—UPI—Perennial challenger Ed Lubanski of Detroit and relative novice Charlotte Grubic of Steelton, Pa., were kingspins of the bowling world today, winners of the 10-day, \$30,200 second annual World's Invitational match game championships.

Lubanski and Mrs. Grubic copped their titles before a national television audience Friday night at the climax of the tourney's 64-game finals.

Lubanski, 28, grabbed the \$5,000 first place money with ease, chalking up a Petersen point total of 317.02 to beat out defending champ Don Carter of St. Louis, who totaled 310.02, good for \$2,500.

Mrs. Grubic, 34, a secretary with a daughter, 12, held out against veteran Elvira Toepfer, a bowling instructor from Detroit, who came within a 10th frame strike of the title. As it was, Mrs. Grubic took the \$2,500 first prize women's money by a Petersen point edge of .05—equal to five pins for the women's 32 game finals.

Lubanski wound up with a 64 game finals average of 213. Carter's was 211.

Oregon's Webfoots Romp Over Wichita by 73-57

Eugene—UPI—University of Oregon capitalized on shaky shooting by Wichita here on Friday night to win their inter-sectional basketball game 73-57.

The game was only close for about the first five minutes. Dale Herron put Oregon in front 15-14 and then Wichita lost the ball five straight times and the Ducks took advantage every time to jump to a 24-16 margin. They led 39-30 at the half.

In the second half Wichita missed its first 14 shots. Al Tate finally broke the ice with nine minutes gone. By this time it was too late for the visitors to catch up.

Wichita hit only eight of 41 attempts in the second half and wound up for the game with a dismal .247 shooting percentage on 19 buckets in 77 attempts. Oregon hit 30 of 69 for a .435 average.

The visitors were without 6-9 center Ev Wessell most of the game. Wessell hurt his knee in a warm-up drill on Thursday night and then re-injured it Friday night.

Herron and Stu Robertson topped Oregon's scoring with 18 points each. Tate was high for Wichita with 24.

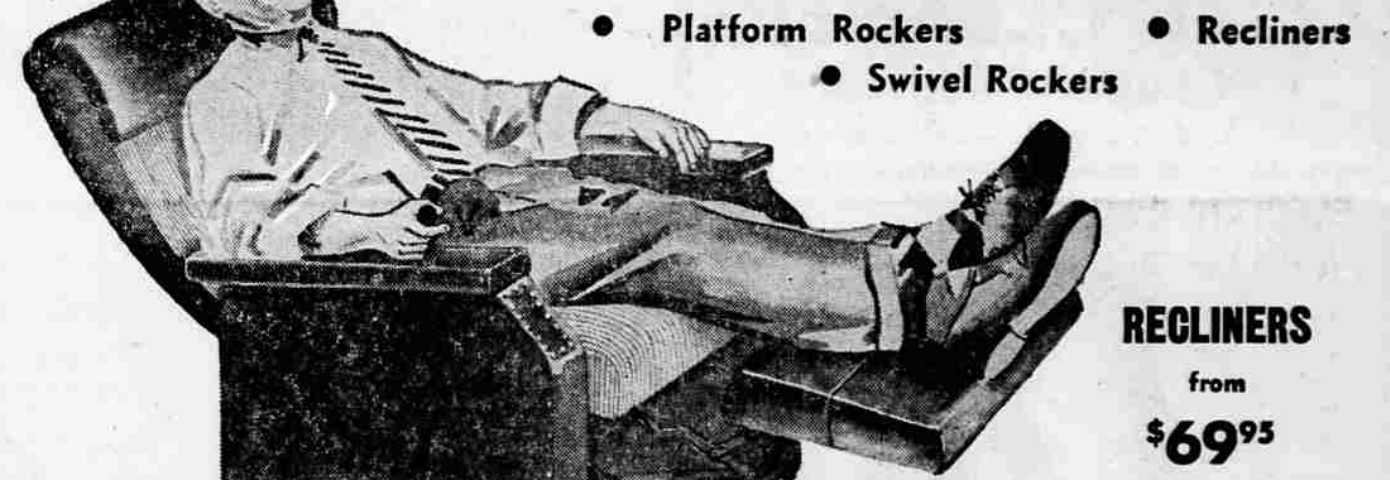
