

Medford Woman Attends AAUN Session in East

Mrs. H. P. Bosworth Jr., member of the Medford chapter, Oregon United Nations association and the board of the Oregon association, returned Friday from the East where she was a delegate to the first biennial convention of the American Association for the United Nations.

The convention was attended by nearly 300 delegates from 38 states, Canada, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Mrs. Bosworth explained that the meeting was the first which members were invited to attend. Delegates were chosen by state associations, she said. Previously the business of the organization was carried on by a 60-member national board of directors who are former members of the League of Nations association.

In addition to the nominations recommended by national, the Oregon and California chapters presented additional nominations for the national board. They were the only chapters, the local delegate reported, who took the initiative offered by the national board earlier this year to submit additional nominations.

Nominates Member

Of the names submitted by the west coast group, Mrs. Bosworth gave the nomination speech for Dr. Jessie Brodie, Portland president of the Pan-American Women's Medical association and member of the Oregon association board of directors. Dr. Brodie was the only member elected to the four-year term on the board of the association who was not nominated by national.

Another Oregonian, Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, wife of Oregon Senator Richard L. Neuberger, was nominated by the national group and also elected to the board.

The organization will promote public knowledge and understanding of the United Nations, Mrs. Bosworth said. One of the highlights of the convention the Medford woman said, was the opportunity for her to talk with the Russian delegation attending the conference.

She explained that in June 1958 at a meeting in Brussels of the World United Federation for United Nations association, the American delegation had been invited by the Russians to visit the Moscow office of the organization.

In return, a delegation from Moscow of four men and two women attended the New York City meeting at the invitation of the United States. One of the delegates, Dr. S. A. Goloumsky, lawyer and criminologist, addressed the convention.

Russian Quoted

Mrs. Bosworth said that at one of the receptions later in the convention she had an opportunity to talk with the man, and since he spoke fluent English, she asked to what he attributed the feeling of hostility and aggressiveness in the world today.

Dr. Goloumsky explained, the local delegate said, that it

Prior to leaving New York, Mrs. Bosworth attended the sessions of the United Nations for one day. The convention started November 22 and continued through November 26.

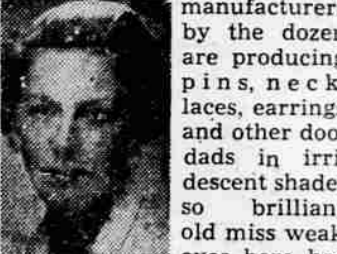

Newest Costume Jewelry Bound to Dazzle Men

New York—UPI—The newest costume jewelry is bound to dazzle any male. Jewelry manufacturers by the dozen are producing pins, necklaces, earrings and other doodads in iridescent shades so brilliant old miss weak eyes here has been looking at them through colored glasses.

The industry calls the jewelry "aurora borealis," after the luminous meteorological phenomenon also known as Northern Lights. This brilliance is possible through a metallic coating process, perfected four years ago by a gem stone firm in Austria.

Used On Cut Gems
Ernest Lowenstein, president of a New York importing firm which distributes the

Austrian products, says that now the coating is being applied by makers in Germany and this country. It is used almost exclusively on clear crystal or colored cut beads and stones.

"After this, rhinestones look dull," said Lowenstein. "Diamonds too? No, ma'am, they're still a girl's best friend."

The Fashion Coordination Institute, which keeps tabs on style trends for the jewelry industry council, said aurora can be found from the cheapest to the most expensive costume jewelry available today.

Used on clear, colorless stones or beads the coating reflects the color of the costume. Used on colored stones or beads, it intensifies and diffuses the basic shade. An emerald stone given the thin metallic cover, take on a peacock sheen. A pale blue stone becomes a deeper, more glittering shade.

Introduced Four Years Ago
The institute has no overall estimates of the percentage of cut gems being coated. But Lowenstein said his firm alone imported seven to eight million dollars in cut gems this year and "we can't meet the demand."

He said the aurora treatment was introduced in jewelry lines four years ago "but
