Miami—(UPI)—The Eastern Airlines strike, entering its fourth week, appeared far from settled today despite a contract agreement with machinists.

Eastern officials and representatives of the International Association of Machinists, IAM, came to terms Sunday on a contract which would provide hourly raises of between 26 and 49 cents over a three-year period.

But the 5,300 mechanics must first ratify the new pact, George M. Brown, president of the Miami machinists local, said it would take at least five days to complete the vote.

Local Residents Hurt in Mishaps During Week End

Three of seven local residents injured in three traffic accidents over the week end were reported in good condition at various hospitals here today.

Two others have already been released after treatment. The other two were reported not hospitalized.

Harry Darwin Bartley, 15, of Old Stage rd., was at Sacred Heart hospital. He, an older brother and their mother were injured in a two-car collision Saturday evening on Highway 62 at Four Corners.

State police said the Bartley vehicle, eastbound on Vilas rd., apparently stopped at Highway 62, then was struck by a southbound vehicle driven by Paul Anthony Hennick, 611 South Riverside ave., after entering the highway. Hennick, suffering from a head injury, was reported in good condition today at Sacred Heart hospital.

Harry Bartley reportedly suffered a fracture to the right side of his head, a broken left thigh, bruises and shock, state police reported. Gary Wayne Bartley, 18, suffered a cut over the left eye, bruises and shock. He was admitted to Sacred Heart hospital and later released.

Suffers Cut
Mrs. Della Mae Bartley, 51, suffered a cut on the upper lip, head injuries, a possible fractured rib and internal injuries, police said. She was reported in good condition today at Rogue Valley Memorial hospital.

Both reportedly refused hospital treatment.

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American Motors Up 3 1/4 Points as Stock Prices Move Ahead

New York—(UPI)—Stocks moved ahead today with a small auto and a giant chain grocery leading the way.

American Motors reached a new high at 39 1/4 up 3 1/4 points and held most of the rise. Record production for the company helped lure in buyers.

Great Atlantic and Pacific new stock made its debut on the New York Stock Exchange. It touched 59 which was a gain of 5 1/2 points over the indicated close Friday on the American Stock Exchange.

Zenith Radio touched a new high at 197 where it was up 14 points. This stock which has risen 129 1/2 points from the year's low split two-for-one early in the year. The current price is equivalent to 394 for the old stock which closed 1957 at 129.

Goodyear gained 2 1/4 at its best. Hoffman Electronics rose more than three points and gains of two or more were set by several others. Issues that helped sustain the industrial average included National Steel up nearly two. Goodyear with its rise more than two at a new high. General Electric up more than a point, and Union Carbide up more than a point. Eastman and DuPont lost a point or more.

Correctional Guidance Head Named by State

Salem—(UPI)—Appointment of Alvin L. (Jack) Frost as guidance supervisor of the new Oregon State Correctional institution here was announced today by Superintendent P. J. Squier.

Frost will be responsible for operation of the guidance section of the institution composed of a trained scientific staff in fields of psychology, sociology and employment.

Upon admittance to the institution a new inmate will first be processed by the guidance section. This will include psychological testing, psychotherapy, if needed, a sociological evaluation and formulation of an efficient method of education and training.

During the first six weeks, the guidance section will prepare complete rehabilitation recommendations for new inmates.

For the past few years Frost has been director of the family and child welfare division of the Community Council in Portland. He was formerly employed at MacLaren school for boys at Woodburn.

The institution is scheduled to open in March.

Parking Service Set To Continue

The Medford Junior Chamber of Commerce will continue to operate a parking service for Christmas shoppers, according to Garry Shuler, chairman of the project.

The service will function on Monday and Thursday nights from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. and on Saturday afternoons from 1 p.m. to store closing time. The shopper may leave his car at either of the two downtown locations designated and marked. These are the First National Bank of Oregon or the U. National Bank of Portland. The car will be parked for 50 cents and returned to the shopper at his or her request.

The parking service is insured and all funds will be used to support other Christmas activities of the Medford Jaycees, Shuler explained.

Portland Man Believed Drowned

Roseburg—(UPI)—A Portland man whose car plunged off the North Umpqua river highway east of here was feared drowned today.

The Douglas county sheriff's office identified the man from papers in his wallet as Leslie F. Brown, 49, who was working on a construction job on the highway.

Sheriff's officers said the car turned over several times Saturday night and landed 10 feet from the river near Rock creek, east of Glide. The wallet was found on the river bank and a cigarette lighter and tools from the car were found in 15 to 20 feet of water.

Jet Engine Noise Worst Fault of Latest Airliners

Washington—(UPI)—The airlines hope they aren't entering the jet age with too much noise.

They mean that literally—the noise of the jet engine is the worst fault of it has.

To keep itself out of broken card-rum suits, and to make communities completely happy to receive jet service, the U.S. aviation industry has spent a fortune finding ways to lessen the jets' inevitable shriek. It is a noise one observer has likened to "the probable mating call of a lovelick dinosaur."

Boeing alone spent \$10 million developing a noise suppressor for its mighty 707. Other jet manufacturers have similar devices.

The Boeing suppressor consists of tubes at the rear of the engines. The hot gases that power the 707 are scattered through the tubes instead of emerging as one noisy blast.

The device cuts the 707's noise level down to that of a conventional piston-engine plane. The noise problem is not eliminated entirely, however, jets scream while piston engines roar, and even though the noise level is the same, the jet is likely to be more annoying.

The airlines will pay for more than just a suppression system. The device, which costs \$25,000 per engine, cuts power about two to three percent and raises fuel consumption slightly. But the airlines figure they are getting a bargain considering the goodwill involved.

There is evidence that the jet noise factor may have been somewhat overrated. Jets climb so fast that they are out of the "nuisance range" far sooner than piston planes. The 707 hits 10,000 feet less than 60 seconds after takeoff—which means less noise outside the immediate airport area itself.

Could Hinder Operation
Nevertheless, their noise could hinder operation of American jet airliners to Europe at the outset. In Britain, for example, Transport and Civil Aviation Minister Harold Watkinson announced three major regulations applying to the U.S. jets pending proof that their noise has been cut to "a reasonable minimum."

The toughest rule, which could delay regular passenger service, specified that until British officials decide the American jets' noise level is acceptable they will be able to take off and land only during "waking hours."

Security Council Aims Israel Charge

United Nations, N.Y.—(UPI)—The U.N. Security Council hoped today to dispose of Israel's charge that the United Arab Republic committed aggression in a series of attacks on Israel from Syrian territory.

The council began debate on the charge last Monday in the first renewal of the Middle East diplomatic cold war here since last May.

Because of the threat of a Soviet veto to any action adversely affecting the United Arab Republic, the council was not expected to take formal action.

In Jerusalem, however, Foreign Ministry sources said Israel would press for a Security Council vote against the U.A.R. despite the possibility of a Soviet veto.
