Olson-Villa Bout Ruled No Contest

Fresno, Calif. (UPI)—Former middleweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson's battle with Young Tommy Villa was ruled a "no contest" today by officials of the California Athletic commission.

The purses of both fighters were withheld pending further consideration by the commission. The ruling came after lengthy debate by ring officials over a low blow thrown by Olson, who is making a comeback as a light-heavyweight.

The action was a reversal of Tuesday night's TKO ruling here.

The San Francisco fighter scored a technical knockout over Tommy Villa, San Jose, Calif., in the fifth round of a scheduled 10-rounder at Memorial auditorium.

However, the victory was booed lustily by a standing room crowd of 4,000. It came when Olson caught Villa with a low blow that sent the San Jose fighter to the canvas.

Bobo and Referee Johnny Reno helped Villa to his corner, where Reno allowed him a five-minute rest period. But Villa was unable to continue, and Olson was awarded the TKO.

Olson dropped Villa with a sizzling right to the stomach in the fourth round, but Reno disagreed with Villa's handlers, who claimed that was a low punch, too.

Bobo, who came in at 175, had previously stopped Don Grant and Paddy Young. Villa came in at 172.

Jerry West Sparks WV Hoop Win

There's fresh evidence today why Jerry West, a lean 6-foot, 3-inch forward, is "Mr. Basketball" to West Virginia.

West, whose development last season sparked West Virginia to the national championship, came through when he was most needed again Tuesday night to lead West Virginia to a 98-67 victory over Richmond. It was the Mountaineers' first game since Saturday's 75-72 loss to Virginia and for a while it seemed they might be victimized by another upset.

Richmond, which made the trip to Morgantown, W. Va., with only seven players, trailed by only 39-34 with two and a half minutes left in the first half. The Mountaineers were playing as listlessly as they did in the Virginia defeat and the partisan crowd feared another upset.

That's when West took over with eight straight points to boost the Mountaineers into a 54-38 half time margin. Richmond never came close thereafter and Coach Fred Schaue yanked the Mountaineers regulars after they opened up a 70-41 bulge with six minutes gone in the second half.

Iba Beats Iba
West scored 29 points and Bob Smith tallied 23 for West Virginia which scored its sixth win in seven games this season. The seventh-ranked Mountaineers have won 26 consecutive games at home and 40 straight games in the Southern conference.

Clarence Iba topped his more famous coaching brother, Hank, as Tulsa scored a 71-50 win over Oklahoma State. Oklahoma City whipped North Texas State, 70-56. Loyola of Chicago defeated Drake 74-71. Arkansas City knocked off Weber College of Utah, 60-44, and Portland beat Washington of St. Louis 63-50.

Mississippi Southern beat Southeastern Missouri, 65-60. Hofstra upset Penn Military, 83-71. Rutgers whipped Columbia, 84-73. Canisius defeated Gannon, 77-54. Yale shaded Brown, 76-32. Rhode Island walloped New Hampshire, 80-65. Baylor beat Abilene Christian, 65-58, and Penn State downed Gettysburg, 71-60, in other games.

Packers Will Give Manager Fuller Power

Green Bay, Wis. (UPI)—The Green Bay Packers have revamped the front office to give the general manager complete power to run the ball club, and were looking today for the man who can make the team into a National Football league contender again.

Just where present General Manager Verne Lewellen and Coach Ray McLean stand after the organizational shake-up was in doubt.

The streamlining of the front office organization that had brought so much criticism left the jobs of both men intact, but also opened the door for their ouster should they not fit into the plans of the man selected to take charge of the club.

Trim to Six
The changes announced by Dominic Olejniczak, Packer president, said the club would seek a "general manager with complete responsibility for all phases of operation including coaching."

The changes also included the trimming of the 13-man executive committee down to six members, the elimination of the posts of chairman of the board and second vice president, and the end to weekly meetings by the executive committee at which a review of each Sunday's game formerly was held.

Top heaviness in the front office which divided responsibility for hiring and firing of personnel has received much of the blame for the Packers' poor records in recent years.

NY Giants Stop Ticket Sales
New York (UPI)—The New York Giants, after enjoying an extra day's rest for their come-from-behind victory over Cleveland, resumed practice today for Sunday's Eastern division playoff game with the Browns at Yankee Stadium.

The Giants' spectacular sweep of a 13-10 verdict last Sunday forced a tie for the Eastern crown and gave New York its biggest ticket rush in the club's history.

Giants officials announced Tuesday night they stopped the public sale of tickets for Sunday's National Football league game after selling more than 50,000 duclats in 36 hours.

"We have enough mail orders to use up what few tickets we have left," one harried official said, "and people are lined up down to the street waiting to buy." The club's office is on the 16th floor.

The only tickets available Sunday will be the 12,000 bleacher and 5,000 standing-room tickets that go on sale at the stadium.
