Telephone Stock Leads Market Higher

New York (UPI)—American Telephone and Telegraph capital stock led the stock market to a new record high on active trading today.

Telephone, most widely held stock listed, soared 21 points Wednesday when directors proposed a three-for-one split and raised the dividend by 10 per cent. It opened on 15,000 shares at the previous close, ran up to a new high since 1930 at 227 1/4 to 4 1/4 and then slipped slightly from the high.

Attention was on other issues which seemed to be split candidates. This embraced high priced stocks such as International Business Machines which made a new high at 501, up 7, Rohm and Haas, at 505 up 1 1/2; Thiokol 99 3/4 up 7 1/4; Warner Lambert 97 1/2 up 3 3/4; Pacific Telephone 149 1/2 up 3 3/4; and Eastman Kodak 141 1/2 up 3 1/2 points.

AWOL Army Man Admits To Theft

James D. Head, a private reportedly absent without leave from the U. S. Army installation at White Sands, N.M., has admitted the theft one week ago of a safe from a farm equipment store here, Medford police said today.

Head is currently being held in the Eugene municipal jail in connection with breaking into a machine shop in Springfield. He confessed the safe theft in a signed statement before Jackson County Chief Deputy Joe Walsh and Medford Detective Dean Abshire.

Head said in the statement that he absented himself from White Sands Oct. 3 and eventually came to live with a friend here in Medford. He said he broke into the office of the International Harvester-McCormick Farm Equipment store, 2232 Biddle rd., early Dec. 11.

He stated that the safe was on rollers and he placed it in the trunk of his friend's automobile, which he had borrowed without permission. He said he dumped the safe seven miles out on Antelope Creek rd. and returned to his friend's home.

That day, according to his statement, Head borrowed the car, drove back out to the safe and broke into it. He took \$70 or \$75, he said, and drove back into Medford to spend the night with his friend and spend some of the money.

The next day, he stated, he took a Greyhound bus to Eugene, where he was arrested for drunkenness and bailed himself out with \$25.

He was reportedly arrested Saturday by the Springfield police for entering the machine shop.

A district court warrant charging burglary not in a dwelling and setting bail at \$2500 was issued by Judge James M. Main here yesterday.

New York Papers Still Strikebound

New York (UPI)—Negotiations were at a standstill today in the nine-day-old deliverers strike against nine major New York City newspapers.

The outlook for a quick settlement was dim. Negotiators for the striking Newspaper and Mail Deliverers Union and the Newspaper Publishers Association, which represents the affected newspapers, were standing by, prepared to resume bargaining talks, but no new meetings were scheduled.

Meanwhile, Mayor Robert F. Wagner was to meet today at city hall with federal mediators Walter A. Maggillo and Frank H. Brown to discuss possible means to end the strike, which has resulted in the furloughing of an estimated 20,000 newspaper employees and dealt a severe blow to advertisers.
