Company Gives Directions For Making Candles

Homemakers interested in making their own decorative Christmas candles, will find useful the instructions issued by the company which sells parowax.

A one-pound candle can be made in the following manner. Remove the four quarter-pound sections of parowax from the carton, sealing two of them together by dipping the flat surface in a shallow pan of melted wax and pressing one on top of the other. Repeat this process with the remaining two blocks.

Score one section down the middle lengthwise with an ordinary beverage can opener to provide space for a piece of candle wicking. This should be dipped in the melted parowax and laid in the groove, leaving approximately 1/2 inch at top of candle.

Dip the flat surface of one of the sections in the melted wax and press together; then quickly turn entire candle in the melted wax, including the protruding end of the wick.

Now the candle is ready for frosting. Melt one-half pound of parowax and beat with electric or hand beater to the consistency of whipping cream, patting the foamy wax on the candle with a spatula or table knife, keeping the candle square. It is also suggested that the frosting be built up approximately 1/2 inch above the top of the candle on all four sides. This forms a retainer for the wax as the candle burns. Do not smooth the frosting, as it will lose a great deal of its effectiveness.

Shake on sparkle. Candles made of parowax are long burning, and because of the transparency of the product, the entire candle glows when lighted. The frosting made from parowax can be used for other decoration, such as tipping pine cones and boughs. Ordinary precautions should be observed when heating and handling wax.

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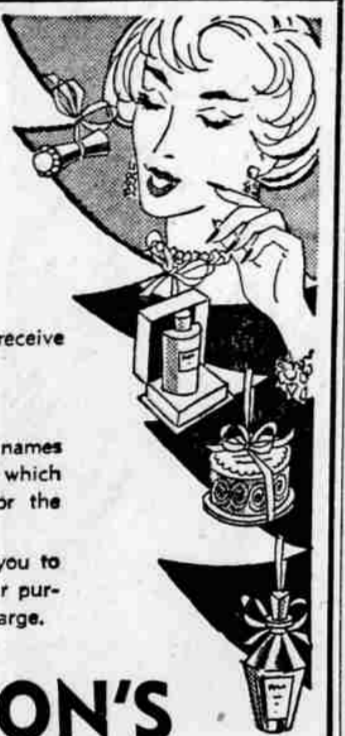
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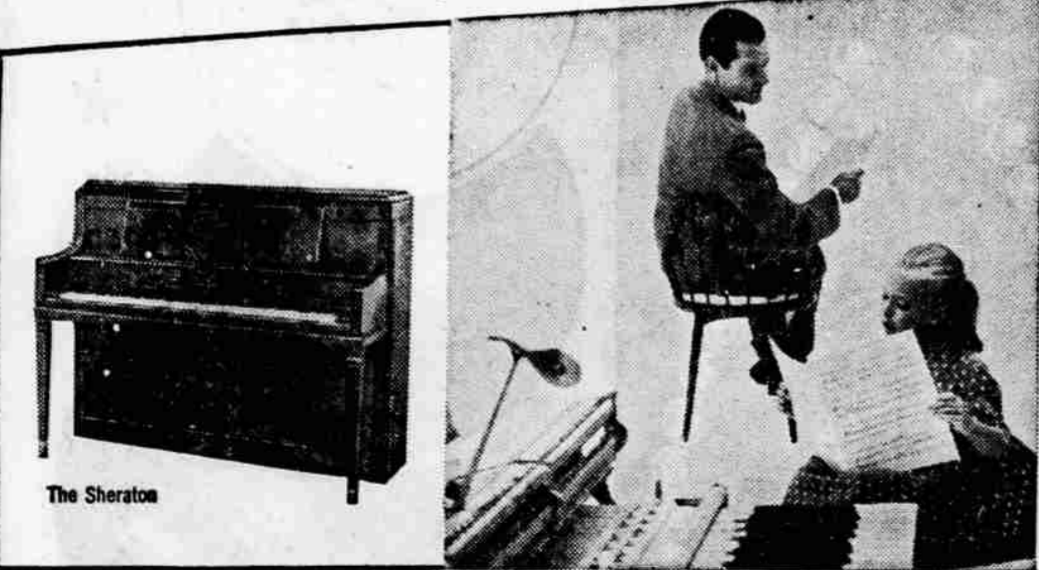


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
