

Black Tornado Beats Axemen; Saturday Game Cancelled by Suspension of South Eugene

Eugene—UPI—An Oregon School Activities association board of control ruling suspending South Eugene High school from all inter-scholastic competition brought cancellation of the Axemen's basketball game scheduled for last night with the Medford Black Tornado.

Suspension was effective as of noon yesterday and halted a Klamath Falls-South Eugene wrestling match which was in progress.

Board of control action arose out of an incident during Tuesday night's Albany-South Eugene basketball game at Eugene when Eugene students painted obscene language on school buses which brought players and students from Albany.

PROTEST FILED

John Cox, Albany school superintendent, filed an official protest with the OSAA board acted on the protest yesterday morning and the suspension resulted.

A review of the suspension will be made at the next OSAA board meeting on Jan. 15. In the meantime, South Eugene's basketball team will have to hang up its suits.

Eugene—Sparked by the shooting and backboard work of Jerry Anderson and gunning effectively from the field, the Medford high basketball aggregation overcame South Eugene here Friday night 48 to 41 in a steadily moving but slow-paced conflict.

It was a close engagement until Medford tucked it away in the last minute of play. South was in front 11 to 9 at the quarter but Medford had 24 to 23 edge at halftime and was ahead 36 to 32 after three quarters.

Anderson had a 16-point tabulation and made 13 retrievals from the backboards to head the Medford effort. Bo Blair and Wally Larsen led the Axemen scoring with 13 and 11 markers, respectively. Dave Wetzell cleared the backboards 12 times for Eugene.

473 From Field

Medford's Black Tornado, shooting less than South, had a 473 average from the field compared to the Axemen's 319 but SE had 33 to margin in rebounding.

Sandy Nosler cut the gap for Eugene to 36 to 34 as the fourth quarter got underway but Anderson got a free toss and Lowell Dean two close in fielders for a 41 to 34 Medford lead. Blair sank two free points but Jerry Shults of the Tornado hit for 43 to 36. Wetzell canned a jump shot and, with two minutes to play, two free heaves for 43 to 30.

Giants, Browns Vie For Eastern Title

New York—UPI—The New York Giants will try to climax a late-season surge Sunday by defeating the Cleveland Browns for a berth opposite the Baltimore Colts in the National football league championship game and a player Christmas jackpot that could reach \$200,000.

The Giants tied the Browns for the Eastern division title last Sunday and set up a playoff game in Yankee Stadium when Pat Summerall booted a 49-yard field goal through falling snow with 127 seconds to go. The Colts finished the Western division title off Nov. 30 and probably will be favored whether they

visit the Giants or Browns for the Dec. 28 championship game.

A crowd of 70,000 will jam Yankee Stadium Sunday for a game which probably will be played in 30-degree temperature on fairly solid turf if the weather forecast holds true. Additional hundreds of thousands of fans will see or hear the game on CBS TV-radio, beginning at 2 p.m. est.

Giants Favored

New York was favored at 6 to 5 in man-to-man betting. Broadway oddsmakers quoted the Giants as 5½ to 6½ favorites. This meant a New York backer would have to risk \$6.50 to win \$5, while a Cleveland roofer would get \$5.50 for a \$5 wager.

If the score is tied at the end of the regulation game, the teams will go into "sudden death" overtime with the first team to score qualifying to play host to the Colts.

Summerall's field goal last Sunday gave the Giants a 13-10 triumph. The Giants also won Nov. 2 at Cleveland, 21-17, and Sunday they will try to become the only club to whip the Browns three times in a season.
