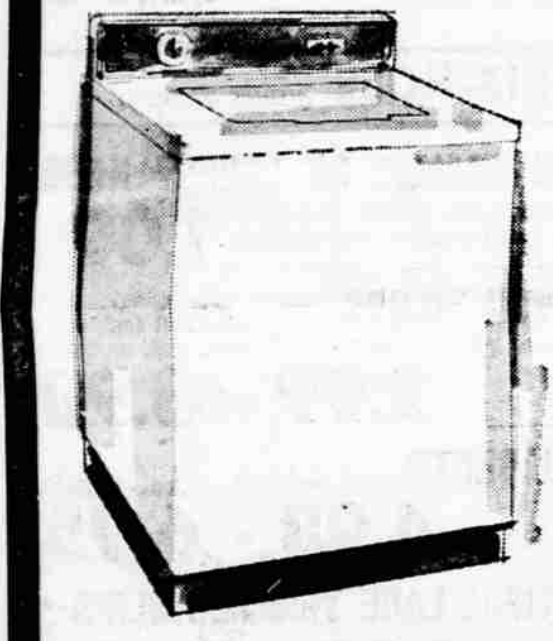

New York—(UPI)—Stocks declined through the first half of today's session and then rallied from their lows. American Telephone had been depressed by more than two points at its low. It came back part way. Oil shares were among the wider losers on Venezuela's move to extract more oil company profits than the 50-50 setup in force until today. They met only meager support with Royal Dutch, Shell Transport and Standard of Jersey active. Steels yielded fractions to a point. Motors eased but Chrysler was well supported on its return to operations after a series of strikes.
