## Financing Defense To Dominate 1959 Congressional Talk

By Congressional Quarterly  
Washington—(CQ)—Can we afford NOT to spend more for defense?

This question, raised with increasing frequency since 1956, will dominate debate in Congress over military affairs in 1959.

President Eisenhower is now expected to place a ceiling of \$41.5 billion on defense spending in fiscal 1960, which begins next July 1. That is little more than the \$41 billion likely to be spent in fiscal 1959.

To stay within this ceiling, the Defense Department has little choice but to cut back on some programs in order to meet the rising costs of others.

## Three Children Die As Home Destroyed

Long Beach, Calif.—UPI—A fire flashed through a two-story frame house early today, killing three small children trapped in an upstairs bedroom.

A passing cab driver spotted the fire in the six-room home and relayed a fire call to his dispatcher before attempting to enter the blazing home.

Mrs. Catherine Sanders, 25, had gone to a store briefly after watching a late television show and returned to find her home enveloped in flames and her children, aged 4 to 8, trapped in the pre-Christmas tragedy.

An official said the blaze of unknown origin spread so fast through the small home that there was no chance for the children to escape down the stairwell.

## Irish Children Celebrate Early

Dublin—UPI—The children of Ireland began celebrating Christmas the last week of November when they welcomed Santa Claus to Dublin.

Traditionally, the big department stores begin the festive season with the arrival of a red-robed, white-bearded Santa whose appearance in the city is the signal for a parade by thousands of children and parents.

But in the strict sense of the word, Christmas in Ireland begins on Christmas Eve. That is the day on which everyone celebrates, from the company presidents to garbage collectors. The nation's bars are brimming over with customers and special shows are run in the theaters and cinemas.

It is also the day when grocery stores, bars and toy shops hand over the proceeds of the Christmas club—the carefully put-aside pennies of the working man which will be plunged into an exciting Christmas Eve for himself and his wife and a delighted series of surprises for his children on Christmas morning.

At midnight on Christmas Eve, celebrations begin. In the churches across the country, special midnight Masses are celebrated in this predominantly Catholic nation. In recent years, attendance has been so great that one needs a special invitation in order to obtain entrance.

On Christmas Eve, too, are the dances, parties, card games and raffles. On Christmas day itself, Ireland spends a quiet, family-type time. Businesses, sporting arenas and bars are closed. The average family man takes his children for a drive or a walk after hearing Mass in the morning, awaiting the big event of the day—the Christmas dinner.
