Gettysburg, Pa. (UPI)—Backstairs at the White House:

Possibly because President Eisenhower has held only two press conferences in the last two months the chief executive recently has been the subject of some critical studies, printed and broadcast, pitched on the idea that he is withdrawing from the reporters.

The burden of several recent widely distributed critiques has been that Eisenhower has just about zero personal relations with reporters in contrast to the two charmers who preceded him, the late

President Roosevelt and former President Truman.

To a degree, this is true. But often the critic of Eisenhower's press relations forgets one simple truth:

The outside or so-called personal relationship between the President and the news-men is just about what it is with virtually all members of his staff, his administration and the Congress.

Rose Bowl — Iowa over California.

Sugar Bowl — LSU over Clemson.

Cotton Bowl — Air Force over TCU.

Orange Bowl — Syracuse over Oklahoma.

Rose Bowl
This looks like a free-scoring game and I'd be a bit cautious about giving away 17 points. The game matches two of the nation's top quarterbacks in Iowa's Randy Duncan and Cal's Joe Kapp.

Iowa has two big, fast lines and a fleet all-around attack which puts the accent on offense. California isn't too deep and, while Iowa's pass defense isn't the greatest, neither are Cal's receivers. Iowa figures to grind 'em down but the hospitality kills the visitors and it could be close.

Sugar Bowl
LSU is a 14-point favorite despite the fact that it is giving away a lot of beef in the line. Sparked by Billy Cannon, it has breath-taking speed and can score from any place on the field.

Clemson has a weight advantage. However, this is a slow team with a mediocre attack. I can hammer out

touchdowns but doesn't figure to match LSU's gifted production.

Cotton Bowl
TCU is an eight-point favorite but from here this is the blue-plate special.

It may be sending a bunch of boys on a man's errand, yet this team d-d tie mighty Iowa, 13-13, early in the year. The way it looks from here, the small, jet-powered Falcons simply ran out of gas along the way through an unbeaten schedule and just made it. But they have had time to rest for this one.

TCU has a big bulge in size but lost to Iowa, 17-0. As a word of caution, they played a more rugged schedule than the Academy.

Orange Bowl
This, with Oklahoma a 14½ point favorite, will be a grind-it-out affair of little deception. The Orange is big, rugged and, despite Oklahoma's reputation, if Chuck Zimmerman can hit with an occasional pass at the right moment, Syracuse could win a close one. Oklahoma has a good defense and one of those old machine-like attacks. Yet, Syracuse has the heft to halt 'em.

Eastern Seacoast Rivers Flooding

Heavy rain continued to soak the Carolinas and Virginia today sending the New river over its banks, and bringing the threat of minor floods along other rivers.

Weather forecasters said the New river was expected to climb about three feet above flood stage at Galax, Va. They said the rain would probably end later today but predicted possible further flooding at the Roanoke, Tar, Neuse and Cape Fear river basins.

In the nation's midsection, an invasion of cold air was expected to chase a spell of springlike weather that saw the mercury climb to a record 51 degrees in Chicago Sunday. The previous high of 50 for the date was set in 1889.

An Arctic air mass pushed into the nation's north central section Sunday and surged southward through the Dakotas into Nebraska. Temperatures tumbled an average of 20 degrees under the influence of the cold air, plunging to near zero early today in North Dakota and to the 20s in Nebraska.

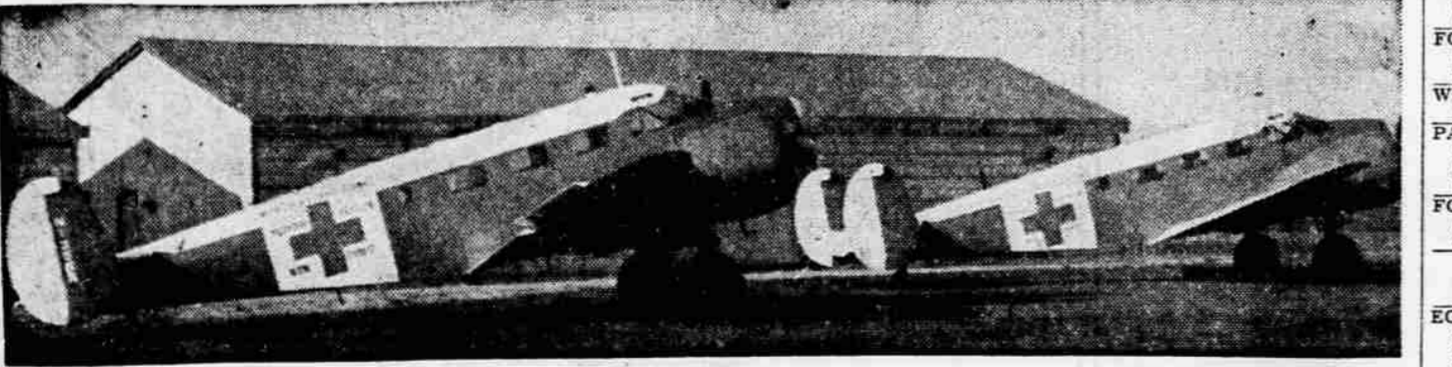
