Five Accidents Are Reported to Police

Five accidents were reported to Oregon state police in less than 24 hours. Several automobiles were damaged and four citations were issued by police.

Wednesday morning two vehicles were heavily damaged following a collision at the Triangle Market, Phoenix. According to police, an automobile operated by Herman Neil Hurd, 59, of 116 North Second st., Talent, pulled across Highway 99 into the market and was struck by a southbound vehicle on Highway 99. The second automobile was operated by Richard Joe Meister, 24, of 113 Mt. Pitt ave., Medford.

Hurd was cited by police for not having an operator's license.

Early today vehicles operated by Rowland Read, 51, of 401 East 12th st., Medford, and Gerald Wilbur Stewart, 38, of 148 Winema Way, Medford, collided on Table Rock rd., approximately 100 feet south of the airport junction. Police said Read, who was traveling south on Table Rock rd., crossed the center line and collided with the northbound vehicle operated by Stewart. Read was cited for failure to operate on right side of highway.

Police said Read's automobile was heavily damaged.

Arthur Charles Bower, 59, of 255 Beal lane, was cited by police for failure to yield right of way following an accident at 1:30 a.m. on Highway 238 at the intersection of Ross lane.

According to state police, the Bower vehicle was traveling east on Highway 238 and pulled off onto the right shoulder of the highway. The vehicle then attempted to make a left turn across the highway. It was struck by an automobile operated by William Carl Bowles, 50, of Legwai, Idaho.

Police said the Bower vehicle received minor damage while Bowles' automobile was damaged on the right fender, headlight and grill.

A 15-year-old Rogue River boy was cited for violation of logic rule at 3:07 o'clock this morning after he lost control of his station wagon on Savage Creek rd. approximately 2 1/2 miles from Highway 88.

According to police, Mallory Brett Lynch, Rogue River, was driving east on Savage Creek rd. when the vehicle failed to make a sharp right curve. Police said the station wagon traveled for 85 feet along the shoulder of the highway, then swerved across the road before cutting back to the opposite side where it went down a steep bank and hit a tree. Police said the automobile was heavily damaged.

The fifth accident occurred at 7:50 a.m. on Highway 252, three miles west of Jacksonville when two trucks, one a loaded log truck, sideswiped. Police said that the truck, operated by Boyd Donald Hamilton, 37, of route 2, box 58, Jacksonville, was damaged and rolled into a ditch in the impact.

It was reported that the log truck did not stop at the scene of the accident. Police said it was dark and foggy at the time of the accident, and was quite likely the other truck driver did not realize that the vehicles had hit.

The Hamilton vehicle had a damaged left front fender and left rear wheel.
