Quotes From the News

Havana—Rebel leader Fidel Castro, announcing an end to general strike in Cuba:
"All military commands are for the revolution. Provisional President Manuel Urrutia is their representative, his investiture has fully restored liberty and the civil power."
New York—Soviet First Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan, on arriving in the United States:
"I want to convey on behalf of the Soviet people our best wishes for happiness in the new year in an atmosphere of tranquility and peace."
New York—Frank D. Chionchio, appealing for the return of his baby daughter kidnaped from her Brooklyn hospital crib 24 hours after birth:
"My wife and I are sure that you are caring for the child as best you can, but we beg of you, if you love the child, please return it so that the little girl can have the care that such an infant needs, and we ask you again to think of the sorrow and heartbreak of the mother."
Moscow—Soviet Academician Anatoly Blagonravov, on space advances by the United States:
"However, in my opinion, the very approach in the United States to the solution of the problem of interplanetary flight is erroneous."

Red Satellite May Orbit Around Moon

Washington—(UPI)—American scientists said today that Russia's next space achievement might be to send a satellite into orbit around the moon.
They pointed to a New Year's statement of Soviet plans to circumnavigate the moon in 1959 as an indication of the direction of the Russian space program.
The U.S. scientists said Russia's new "cosmic rocket, which bypassed the moon, eventually would return to earth. They said, however, it may take hundreds of years and that it would be unlikely that anyone would know when the moon returned to earth."
The U.S. calculations were based on Soviet announcements indicating that the 3,200-pound lunar vehicle will go into an elliptical orbit around the sun, taking 15 months to complete one orbit.
Meanwhile, Dr. T. Keith Glennan, head of the new U.S. civilian space agency, conceded that the United States has no long-range space program.
He said the first task of his National Aeronautics and space administration (NASA) will be to develop such a program covering both military and civilian projects.

Springfield Man Shot Accidentally

Springfield, Ore.—(UPI)—Leroy B. Bartlett, 62, of Springfield, former city manager here and in Montpelier, Vt., was killed Sunday night as a 30-06 rifle he was taking from his car accidentally discharged.
The bullet struck him in the middle of the forehead, police said. He was dead on arrival at a Eugene hospital.
The accident, which occurred about 8 p.m., was witnessed by a neighbor, Mrs. Allen Jacobs, wife of a state policeman. She said she was washing dishes and noticed Bartlett from her kitchen window. He walked to his car, there was a shot and he slumped to the ground, she said.
The victim's wife, Faye, said her husband had gone hunting Sunday afternoon and left his gun in his car when he returned. Just before 8 p.m., he went out to get the rifle. The shot was heard soon after he left the house.
