Attorney Says Plan Reactionary

Portland—UPI—An attorney for a private power company Wednesday called proposals for a federal power corporation for the Columbia river basin as a "reactionary in concept," and favored a super-agency that is not needed in the Pacific Northwest. High Smith, attorney for Pacific Power and Light company, spoke to the League of Women Voters here in opposition to a U.S. Senate bill on which committee hearings were held last month. Smith said the bill "is based on a philosophy that looks back to the time and situation of the middle 1930's instead of toward the realities of the 1960's, which are upon us."

The league last month also heard Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.), speak in favor of the bill, which he is sponsoring in Congress.

Stocks Regain Half Of Recent Decline

New York—UPI—Stocks regained half of Wednesday's sharp decline. Metals, selected chemicals, motors, oils and special issues featured the recovery. Automobile issues responded to reports of sharply higher auto sales. Their gains ranged to more than a point in American Motors and Ford.

Steel issues moved higher and metals ruled strong despite a decline in the London metal market. Gains in the group ranged to more than 2 points in Cerro de Pasco.

Ashland Pool Cover Construction Begun

Ashland — New end walls for a plastic bubble, which will replace the one which collapsed at Twin Plunges swimming pool here over the week end, are being installed, according to Leslie Dobson, manager of the pool.

The new plastic covering is expected to arrive by the end of the month and is reported to be much stronger than the one which was installed last month. Dobson said that the new covering will have a nylon thread running through the plastic every one-quarter inch. The old bubble collapsed during a windstorm. No one was in the pool at the time since Dobson had closed the area earlier in the evening. The covering is being replaced by the manufacturer.

State to Appeal Case Against Copco

Salem—UPI—The State Forestry Board will appeal to the Oregon Supreme Court a case against the California-Oregon Power company for fire damage of approximately \$40,000 on Sykes creek in Jackson county.

Previously Circuit Court Judge Orval J. Millard held against the state, ruling that the power company's easement through forest lands did not constitute ownership or control of the land.

The state alleges the power company had righted a fallen tree to clear some land and that the tree later blew over a power line starting the fire.

College Enrollment Expected Over 1,000

Ashland — Registration at Southern Oregon college for the winter quarter is expected again to exceed 1,000 students, college officials reported today.

At the close of the third day of registration at the college, 976 students had registered or approximately 10 percent above the same period for the 1958 winter term.

Registration will continue through Friday at Churchill hall. Record enrollment at the college was for the term starting last September when 1,150 students registered.

Gale Force Winds Battered Anchorage

Anchorage, Alaska —UPI— Gale force winds battered Anchorage Tuesday night and Wednesday, causing a possible million dollars damage to private property and to aircraft at Elmendorf Air Force Base.

The highest gusts at Elmendorf reached 75 mph. Some pedestrians were bruised by being blown off their feet on the ice-covered streets. However, no serious injuries were reported.
