Washington—Republican National Chairman Meade Alcorn on Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson's "state of the union" speech at the opening of Congress:

"It was a sorry opening day spectacle indeed."

Fertilized Human Egg Packed With Information

Washington — (UPI) — In a blob of living matter little larger than the point of a dull pin is packed enough information to fill a library of 1,000 volumes.

That is the way Dr. George W. Beadle describes the fertilized human egg with its cargo of 10,000 to 100,000 genes, the heredity elements which say what the egg will become.

"Collectively," Beadle said, "the genes may be thought of as the directions for development — in the case of the human egg, a kind of recipe for a person."

The minute directions and instructions carried by the genes, all jammed in the egg's nucleus, "constitute a very large amount of information; an amount," Beadle estimated, "equivalent to the contents of a good-sized library of say, 1,000 volumes."

Break The Code
Beadle, a Nobel prize-winner, is chairman of the California Institute of Technology's Division of Biology. He presented a paper on life, heredity, and evolution on Thursday night at a forum on "Resources for the Future."

Beadle said that in recent years scientists have learned a lot about genes. They have created genetic material in the test tube. They believe they have broken the code by which genes direct and control the chemistry of life.

"Understanding the nature of life is thus replacing mystery," Beadle said.

Much More To Learn
But there is much more in the egg than science so far has been able to get out of it.

"If we could but expose the secrets that lie locked within this minute sphere," Beadle said, "we would have achieved complete understanding of man, including the manner of his origin from sub-human ancestors and the nature of his destiny in an evolutionary future now unknown."

Beadle said this will not be accomplished "in your time or mine nor in the time of our sons and grandsons."

Mayors Demand Troops Withdraw

Leopoldville, Belgian Congo — (UPI) — African mayors of the Leopoldville towns demanded today that Belgian authorities withdraw their troops from native villages where 42 Africans died in riots early this week.

Mayors of the municipalities of Matete, St. Jean, Kinshasa, Ngiri-Ngiri, Banda-lungwa, Kalamu, Kintambo, Ndjili and Barumbu made their demands in a memorandum sent to Gov. Gen. H. Cornelis and to Leopoldville's Gov. Henry Bomans.

They also asked that a complete death toll in the riots be published, that a communal police force be formed to keep the peace and that the curfew be shortened.

The mayors told newsmen they would suspend all cooperation with the authorities, and even resign, if their demands were not met soon.

Turkey Marketed in Sausage Form Now

Des Moines, Iowa — (UPI) — The usual twice-a-year chore of turkey carving no longer may be a problem.

The bird now can be marketed in sausage form for slicing hot or cold, an industry spokesman said.

Bachelor Faces Old Age Without Nest

New York — (UPI) — A 75-year-old bachelor who parlayed his \$71.10-a-month relief check into investments worth \$21,000 faced his old age today without a nest egg.

Harry Schweitzer, a retired hospital orderly, had been piling up a modest fortune by buying blue chip stocks with his relief money for the last 20 years. Then an anonymous letter led to his arrest Thursday on charges of defrauding the Welfare department of \$2,453.85 during the past two years.

In addition, the Welfare department has informed Schweitzer that he owes the city \$17,000, the total amount he has obtained on relief. This will leave the old man about \$5,000. The city already has closed out his two savings accounts totaling \$1,625.10 and is in the process of selling his stocks.

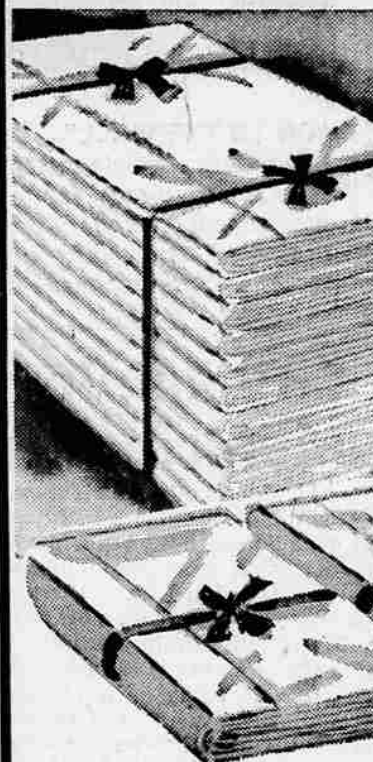
