

Duncan Refused Visit With Mother

Ventura, Calif.—UP—Attorney Frank Duncan, 29, Sunday was refused permission to visit his mother who is in county jail pending trial for plotting the murder of her son's pregnant wife.

Deputies said Sheriff William Hill ordered that only her attorney, S. Ward Sullivan, two court-appointed psychiatrists and a minister or doctor be allowed to see Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Duncan, 54, before her trial Feb. 16.

Sullivan, who accompanied Duncan to jail, said he would seek to have the sheriff's order rescinded Tuesday when Augustina Baldonado, 25, and Louis Moya, 22, appear in court for arraignment.

The two men are accused of strangling Mrs. Olga Duncan, 20, and leaving her body in a shallow grave last Nov. 18. They have confessed that the murdered woman's mother-in-law promised them \$6,000 to kill the attractive Canadian-born nurse.

The Medical Roundup

Whiplash Injuries Many a person today suffers what is called a whiplash injury to the neck which is produced when a careless driver bounces forward again.

At the San Francisco meeting of the American Medical Association, Drs. E. T. Tyler and H. J. Olson, of the University of California in Los Angeles, reported experience with a number of the new synthetic progesterones (anti-female hormones) and a new synthetic testosterone (male hormone) in the relief of women who tend to abort when they get pregnant.

As a result, for some time after, the person will suffer discomfort or pain either in the region in which the skull joins the top of the spine, or all over the neck and shoulders, and perhaps down one arm and into a hand. Rarely do x-ray films show anything wrong.

At a recent surgical meeting, Dr. Edward L. Compere, an able teacher at the Northwestern Medical School in Chicago, described a method of treating this condition by exerting traction of about three pounds on the head, especially at night, or when the patient is in bed. From a cushioned belt which runs under the jaw and under the back of the neck a rope runs over a pulley and down to a little basket which holds the weight. When the patient has to get up and go to work, he can for a time, wear a collar made out of plaster of paris. Fortunately, in most cases the person gets well after a few weeks, even without much treatment—unless he has a compensation lawsuit pending, and then worry may keep him in pain for months.

Other clues listed by the Hearing Aid Industry Conference to indicate whether or not your hearing is normal include: Do you habitually turn one side of your head toward a speaker? Do people seem to be mumbling more often than they used to? Do you fail to hear a big improvement when listening to hi-fi?

Do you often ask people to repeat what they said? Ever bothered by a "ringing" in your ears? Do you have trouble hearing at the movies or at church? Do you occasionally have trouble locating the source of a sound?

A yes answer to some of these questions means you ought to have your hearing checked by a physician.

London—UP—Labor troubles are holding up construction of London's first skyscraper. The new headquarters building of the Shell Petroleum Co., will be 26 stories and 338 feet tall when completed.

That is higher than any other office building in this low-lying city and only 27 feet lower than London's tallest landmark, historic St. Paul's Cathedral, whose dome reaches 365 feet.

The building is scheduled for completion by some time in 1961. But a rash of strikes—called without union sanction but with Communist endorsement—have made it doubtful that the target date will be met.

Until recently, London construction regulations barred buildings more than 11 stories and about 120 to 150 feet tall. But because of modern construction methods these regulations have been relaxed and several skyscraper buildings are planned.

Southgate, England—UP—The caretaker at the Southgate Rugby club left a note for officials saying police had telephoned to warn that a thief was operating in the district, and to be careful to lock up. When the officials arrived at the club Sunday, they found a postscript to the note—"too late"—apparently signed by thieves who had taken 50 bottles of liquor and 3,000 cigarettes.

San Jose, Costa Rica—UP—A former American newspaperman has set up shop in Costa Rica under the unique address and title of "El Anciano"—The Ancient One.
