Gregory B. - My wife and I are in our late 30's and have five children. We are happily married and our children are getting along nicely in our community.

The family has every reason to be pleased with our present setup, but I have long been dissatisfied with my situation in my business organization and I would like to move back to my native city and open my own business there. It is a dream I have had for many years.

My wife likes it where we are and she is afraid of the risk of changes. However, she simply doesn't understand what I go through when I have to stand aside and see other men, not as competent as I am, move ahead of me in our organization. I have the ability to take on large responsibilities, yet I am forced to use only a small part of my potential. It's so frustrating I'm getting an ulcer.

Sandra B. - I can never get Greg to realize that I do understand his frustration and I do feel terrible about his unhappiness on his job. Each time something especially exasperating happens I just cry for days. The people who run things in some of our big companies just aren't fit to hold their jobs.

Nevertheless, I say that it is worth a great deal to have this wonderful security. My own father was in business and I know something about the headaches and risks you encounter. Greg has never had to deal with anything like that. It would be different if he were a young man with no responsibilities, but at his age it would be a hard thing to have to get used to.

I feel that Greg should be grateful that he has a sympathetic wife and a wonderful family. He should try to take his working hours in stride and look for enjoyment in his leisure hours.

The Council: Sandra is a sympathetic wife, but she could be a bit more understanding. A man can't very easily treat his working hours as of no importance. His work represents a large part of his identity. It would be a little like telling a woman not to worry about her children when they have serious problems and telling her to put her mind on outside pleasure instead.

In her desire to be sympathetic Sandra tends to coddle rather than help her husband. He comes home to her like a hurt child, telling of the wounds he has received and she tries to comfort him by kissing the hurt away and cussing out the big, bad bullies who inflicted it.

This is comforting as an immediate remedy, but in the long run it is of little help to a child and considerably less to an adult.

Sandra would do her husband and herself a far better turn if she tried to help him find the causes of his trouble with his company. She should help him analyze each situation as coldly and objectively as possible. Together, they'll probably find that Greg has in some way been at fault in handling his job or the personalities connected with it. They should be aware of the fact that most victims are self-made.

Careful analysis may show the very unlikely possibility that Greg's situation with his company has become damaged beyond repair. In such case, Greg would have to choose between an ulcer plus a lifetime of misery and the risk of making some change. If the decision to make a change is honestly and sensibly arrived at, the risk will probably seem much less forbidding.

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## Families Burying Dam-Burst Victims

Ribadelaide, Spain - (UPI) - Grieving families have begun burying their dead while government and volunteer workers dug through rubble searching for more victims of a spectacular dam burst which all but wiped out this mountain village.

The official count of the dead and missing rose to 142, but a well-informed government official said the final death toll may near 200.

The first mass burial took place in the little cemetery that lies above the site where the village stood when a great wall of water from the burst dam smashed into it at 4 a.m. Friday.

An estimated 125 of the village's 150 buildings were demolished and all the one left standing, including the Catholic church, were damaged.

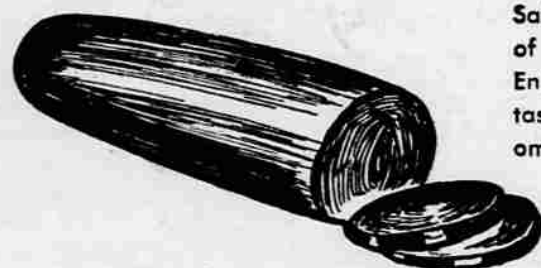

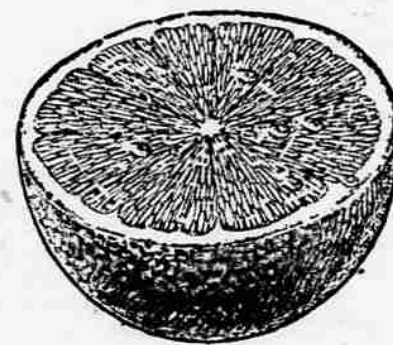
