What Is The Law?

This column is prepared as a public service by the College of Law, Willamette University, Salem, to explain basic legal principles, not to provide legal advice. The reader is cautioned not to apply these cases to his own problems without an attorney's advice, for differing facts may change the outcome.

A Non-Owner Can Collect

Conway has contracted to move Johnson's house from one lot to another for \$2,500. Conway has expended \$800 in preparation for moving, when he learns that Johnson has allowed the fire insurance on the property to lapse. Conway then insures the house in his own name. While the house is being moved, it burns.

The insurance company claims Conway did not have an "insurable interest" in the property since he was not the owner and did not even have a lease on the house. Is this objection by the insurance company a good defense in an action by Conway against the company?

No, Conway may collect. He does have an insurable interest in the property. He has expended money and has expected profit, which would be lost if the building were destroyed. If Conway collects more than enough to cover his loss, the additional amount will be held by him in trust for the owner.

Fire insurance, like other classes of property insurance, is a contract whereby the insured may be reimbursed for losses suffered. It is necessary only that the person taking out the insurance be in a position to suffer loss if the property is destroyed. In order to have this insurable interest, it is not necessary that he own the property, or even have a lien on it.

If he does not have this insurable interest and would suffer no loss, the contract would be a mere wager or bet that the property would burn. Such a policy would encourage willful destruction of property. Therefore, it is against public policy to permit insurance contracts unless this "insurable interest" exists.

Occasionally, even where a person has an insurable interest, he may burn his property for the purpose of collecting insurance. It would not ordinarily pay the insured to do this because it is difficult to collect more than the property is worth and, of course, it is a serious crime to do such a thing.

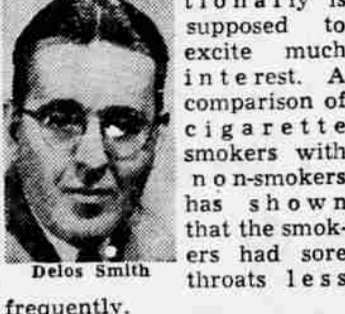
Studies Only Parents

After acknowledging the weaknesses of his statistical basis, too few numbers and the possibility of "self selection," Boake had this to say, in reporting to the New England Journal of Medicine: "Nevertheless, this population has been under continuous, detailed observation and the incidence, distribution and nature of respiratory infection have varied very little over eight years. The pattern has been similar from year to year."

No Difference To Cold Susceptibility By Cigarette Users

New York—This is a science version of the man-bites-dog story which traditionally is supposed to excite much interest. A comparison of cigarette smokers with non-smokers has shown that the smokers had sore throats less frequently.



Scientist W. C. Boake of Western Reserve University, Cleveland, resorted to statistics to find out if smokers were more likely to catch the common cold and other respiratory infections causing coughing, sore throat, and hoarseness than non-smokers.

Medical science generally believes smokers are more susceptible to respiratory infections but it has no hard evidence to back up the view, as Boake pointed out. His statistical results are disputations, therefore, and are going to start a lot of arguments.

They indicated there is no difference in susceptibility between smokers and non-smokers. They showed also that whereas the smokers of the study were more likely to be coughers while infected, they were less likely to be either hoarse or to have sore throats.

Says Results Puzzling
None of this can be taken as evidence "that smoking affords protection against respiratory disease," Boake warned. He granted that the results were puzzling and also there could be things wrong with the statistics.

"If it is assumed that the symptoms occurring during a respiratory infection are a direct result of the infectious process itself—that is, caused by inflammation in the respiratory tract—it is difficult to understand why one symptom (cough) should be increased in frequency (in smokers) and two other symptoms, presumably manifestations of the same process, should be diminished," he said.

Boake got his statistics from Western Reserve's famous continuing study of 59 well-heeled Cleveland families. The study began in 1948 and all illnesses and the general physical conditions of these 118 parents and their children have been carefully followed in fine detail ever since.
