### Quick Tuna Souffle

Preheat the oven to 300 degrees. Then open a can of cream of celery soup and a 6 1/2 ounce can of tuna. Heat 1/2 of the can of soup with the tuna. When it bubbles, turn out the flame and blend in 4 egg yolks. Beat the 4 egg whites until stiff. Fold the egg whites into the tuna mixture and pour into a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake the souffle 50 minutes. Dilute the remaining soup with 1/4 can of milk, add 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento and 2 tablespoons toasted slivered almonds. Serve as a sauce over the souffle. Serves 3 to 4.
