Polaris in Fully Successful Flight

Cape Canaveral, Fla. - (UPI) - A trim Polaris, the Navy's immediate range missile with ICBM reach, catapulted out over the Atlantic today in the first fully successful flight of the weapon in its final stage. The 28-foot missile, shaped like a bowling pin, leaped from its launching platform and headed southeast on an 800-mile flight. The Navy said the second half of the two stage solid fuel missile burned out about two minutes after firing. Smaller and lighter than other intermediate ballistic missiles, the solid fuel Polaris is designed to be fired from either a submerged or surface submarine. The Lockheed missile has a range of about 1,700 land miles, but from its mobile launching vehicle it could hit any target on earth.

Cleaning House To Speed Progress in Space Program

Washington - Science Service - Cleaning house in government to speed up U.S. space progress was recommended here to the Institute of the Aeronautical Sciences by retired Air Force Gen. Orval R. Cook, now president of the Aircraft Industries Association of America.

Gen. Cook said the nation made progress when Congress created the National Aeronautics and Space Administration last year. NASA serves as a focal point for U.S. space activities.

But Gen. Cook struck out at other agencies "that merely constitute a non-productive administrative channel."

"The proper people in government should carefully analyze all agencies and departments which have large scientific and engineering staffs to determine whether we have too many scientists and engineers looking over the shoulders of other scientists and engineers without materially contributing to their objectives," he said.

New York - (UPI) - Stocks turned down today. Losses in some issues ranged from one to more than two points. At the same time a long list of new favorites rose one to more than five points. Grenada Man Killed in Auto Accident Sunday

Hornbrook - Charles Ogden Urquhart, 51, of Grenada, Calif., was killed and a passenger in the pickup he was driving was seriously injured Sunday afternoon when the vehicle left the Copco highway northeast of Hornbrook and plunged into the Klamath river.

In the Siskiyou county hospital, Yreka, is Gilbert Pimentel, 41, of the Little Shasta area. He is reported to be suffering from facial lacerations, shock and hip injuries.

According to the Siskiyou county sheriff's office George Marion Grieb, Hornbrook, was driving toward Copco Sunday afternoon when he spotted Pimentel floating in the river.

He pulled the man to shore and learned of the accident. A passing motorist took the injured man to the hospital.

During dragging operations to recover the truck and Urquhart's body, California Oregon Power company officials cut the water flow in the river in half to aid the search. Sheriff's deputies said that the truck had left the highway near Jenny creek, about 14 miles northeast of Hornbrook where it was found. The body was located about 200 yards downstream.

Urquhart was the barber in Grenada. He is survived by his wife, parents, and several brothers and a sister. Girdner Funeral home, Yreka, is in charge of funeral arrangements.

Fishermen Object Of Plane Search

Honolulu - (UPI) - An intensive air search continued today for three commercial fishermen whose small boat disappeared in a storm which ripped through the Hawaiian islands over the week end.

The storm, driven by winds up to 100 miles per hour, struck Saturday and continued through Sunday. Only one injury was reported.

The howling winds ripped roofs off dozens of homes, collapsed outbuildings, sunk at least 15 small craft at moorings, and snarled communications and power lines.

At least two dozen homes were damaged on Oahu, and heavy damage was reported on the island of Hawaii.

Reedsport - (UPI) - The body of a man was found about one mile north of the north jetty of the Umpqua river Saturday and was identified as Robert Peterson, 23, Winchester Bay.
