

What Is The Law?

Accident Causes Hair To Turn White

Sara, a woman of 55, was struck by an automobile negligently driven by Alvin, while she was waiting to board a street car. At the trial certain witnesses testified that before the accident Sara's chestnut hair was just beginning to turn gray but that in a day or two after the accident it turned snow white. No physicians were called to express an opinion as to whether the change in color of her hair was a result of her injury.

Legal Error Alleged

The jury decided in favor of Sara's appeal; Alvin's attorney alleged that it was legal error to permit a jury to guess or speculate, without the help of medical opinion, that the discoloration of the hair had been caused by the accidental injuries.

The appellate court, affirming the judgment, cited Byron's "The Prisoner of Chillon" as authority for the statement that it is common knowledge or belief that hair may grow white in a single night from sudden fears.

This is such a widely accepted fact, said the court, that it was not necessary to get medical testimony on the subject. As an illustration, the court said that if Sara testified she was struck in the eye and got a black eye, it would be unnecessary to produce an expert witness to say that an "extravasion" of blood resulting in ecchymosis might follow such a blow.

On the other hand, it was pointed out that other more remote and subtle effects, such as cancer or tuberculosis, would call for more than a layman's knowledge of cause and effect. The court felt that medical evidence would not have added anything to this case, so the failure to produce it was not error.
