## German Measles in Early Pregnancy Continues Alarming

New York—(UPI)—Medical science has a new and even more urgent reason for wishing German measles on all little girls.

The first study of its kind showed that approximately 30 percent of the babies of women who had the disease during the first 16 weeks of pregnancy, were born deaf to a greater or lesser degree.

Women who had the common childhood disease in childhood don't run the risk of catching it again, especially at the only time it represents a real danger, not to them, but to their forming babies.

This danger has been known since 1941 but it was thought to be less than the new study revealed, and little was known about the possible risk of deafness for the unborn.

**Some Advocate Infection**

Nevertheless, doctors now fervently hope the little girls will catch it whenever German measles appears in a family group. Some doctors try to see to it that the girls don't escape. A few have been advocating deliberately infecting female children with the virus, in a reversal of vaccinating children to prevent them from catching specific diseases.

The new study was doubly impressive because it was "prospective." Previous studies have started with children with congenital defects and worked backward, to see if the mothers had had German measles while pregnant. The new study started with women who were infected in early pregnancy and went forward to see how the children developed during the first five years of life. That's a "prospective" study.

Drs. A.D.M. Jackson and L. Fisch had 46 children of Ger-

man measles mothers who were three to five years old. They had 46 other children whose mothers had not been infected during pregnancy. None of the latter had any kind of defect. Fifteen of the former had "major" defects and in 14 the defect was deafness.

**Undetected Previously**

This high deafness rate had been undetected in previous studies because the children hadn't been properly tested for hearing and because they hadn't been followed for longer than the first year of life the scientists reported in the international technical journal, "The Lancet."

The scientists urged that exhaustive hearing tests should be made of all children born to mothers who had German measles in early pregnancy. Deafness in very young children can easily be unnoticed. It was their "impression" the doctors said, that the four children with the most severe deafness "showed an abnormal behavior pattern. These children tended to be restless, destructive, spiteful, and unable to concentrate."

**Passenger Radio Use on Planes Given Clearing**

Washington (Science Service)—The Radio Technical Commission for Aeronautics told Science Service here that passenger-operated hearing aids and "Distaphone-type recorders" may be used aboard commercial airplanes without interfering with the plane's intricate instrumentation.

A special RTCA committee set up to investigate the degree to which portable radios, recorders and similar equipment interferes with an airplane's radio receivers, is about to issue a recommendation to its member organizations that hearing aids and recorders be given clearance for air line use.

**Member Organization**

Among member organizations are the Federal Aviation Agency (formerly the Civil Aeronautics Administration), the Federal Communications Commission and the Air Transport Association of America. The RTCA's findings are submitted as recommendations not rulings.

The recommendations on hearing aids and recorders are the only two agreed on by the committee thus far. At another meeting in the latter part of February the following problems will be considered:

1. What frequency bands may be critical.
2. What levels of interference on these bands can be tolerated.
3. Establishment of test procedures to determine levels of radio frequency radiation of any portable device.

**Use Discouraged**

Passenger use of portable radios and the like has been discouraged or prohibited by most air lines ever since recent cases of interference to aircraft communications navigation and integrated flight instrumentation systems had been traced directly to passenger operated portable recorders and radio receivers.

Most air lines do not flatly forbid use of portable radios, but notify their flight service personnel to watch for passengers who might be using them. Such passengers are either asked not to use them during the entire flight or during portions of the flight or are carefully watched by the pilot of the existence of a radio on board. They do insist that such devices not be used during take-off or landing when reliance on instruments is especially important.

**Crook School Crisis Studied**

Prineville—(UPI)—Crook county school officials today scheduled a meeting next Monday night to discuss a crisis brought on by the cutting of fof state aid because of overcrowded conditions.

The state action was disclosed Tuesday. Local officials were advised by the State Department of Education that the schools had been placed on the non-standard list.

Cecil Sly, superintendent of Crook county schools, said that another bond issue probably would be submitted. A bond issue for improving and enlarging schools has been turned down three times.

Sly said the district would get its second quarter payment of \$78,000 which is due now but that the third payment, due in April, would not be paid unless a plan is presented which will alleviate overcrowding.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at 8:30 o'clock P.M. on the 5th day of February, 1959 in the Council Chambers of the City Hall in the City of Medford, Oregon, there shall be a public hearing by and before the City Council of said City on the question of amending section 3, Ordinance No. 5135, to read as follows, to-wit:

"SECTION 3.  
8. Name, plates and signs as follows:  
One non-illuminated name plate not exceeding one square foot in area, placed flat against the building, for each dwelling used for home occupation. One non-illuminated temporary sign not exceeding five square feet in area, pertaining to the lease, rental or sale of the building or premises on which it is located.  
Non-illuminated sign designed and erected for the sole purpose of identifying and advertising an undeveloped subdivision. Such a sign may be installed after approval by the Planning Commission of the tentative plat of the subdivision which it identifies but must be removed not later than one year after installation, unless the Planning Commission, upon due application prior to the termination of this ordinance, in which case an extension for an additional year may be granted. The sign shall have an area not exceeding fifty square feet, an over-all dimension not exceeding ten feet and the top of the sign shall be not more than fourteen feet above the general surface of the ground. Not more than one sign shall be erected in each subdivision. All such signs shall be subject to the same setback requirements as are imposed in the case of structures in Class 1A, Single Family Dwelling Districts."
