Drivers Licenses Suspended Listed

Salem — The department of motor vehicles has released names of 267 drivers whose licenses were ordered suspended during the period beginning Jan. 12, and ending Jan. 16.

Length of suspension varies, depending on charges involved, recommendation of court, discretionary action by the department or requirements of Oregon law. The department said some of the licenses involving financial responsibility and court recommendations may have been reinstated after suspension was ordered.

The department warned drivers that the penalty for driving while suspended is a jail sentence of no less than two days and up to six months and there may be imposed a fine up to \$500. Under licensing procedures, this will also result in an additional year of suspension.

School Intruder Due For Shock If Gadgets Work

Memphis, Tenn. — (UPI) — Some intruder is in for the shock of his life.

School officials, concerned about continuing night-time mischief in and around school buildings, announced Thursday they have decided to try out the "tattler" — a device that transmits radar waves over a 50-foot radius.

When movement occurs within the monitored area, the gadget automatically: Telephone police. Sets off a bright flashing light. Triggers a siren. And takes a photograph of the intruder.

Portland Narcotics Suspect Killed

Portland — (UPI) — Fred Moe, alias Moe Yim, 45, arrested last week as a suspect in a huge narcotics ring operating out of Red China, was killed Thursday night in an automobile accident.

Authorities said Moe was alone in his car when it crashed into a concrete pillar on a Portland expressway. Deputies said there were no skid marks and there was no evidence of alcohol in the car.

Moe was arrested here by federal narcotics agents on a charge of conspiracy to violate the U.S. narcotics laws. He was arraigned Jan. 14 and released on \$15,000 bail.

Tornado Grapplers Nudge Crater High Team 25-23

For the second match in a row team victory for Medford high wrestlers hinged on the final bout of the evening.

Black Tornado grapplers tipped Crater 25 to 23 here last night.

The win came a bit tougher than on Tuesday when Medford won the final two tiffs by pins to top Ashland 30 to 20.

Last night the Tornado trailed 20 to 21 with two matches left. Then Medford's Fred Funston decided to Crater's Lorenzo Miller in the 178-pound bracket to put the Tornado in front by a slim 23 to 21. In a tense unlimited weight finale Charles Shaw gained a draw with Crater's lighter Rick Burns to preserve a two point margin for Medford. A Burns verdict would have given the Comets the match.

Crater jumped off to a 13 to 0 lead when Gary Meade, Butch Barber and Dave White took the first three bouts. Turning point for Medford came when Dan Eddy pinned Charles Warren, Crater, in the 122-pound division in the fourth bout of the match.

Ray Smith, 129, recorded another pin for Medford to cut the margin to 13-10. John Taberna, 135, got a decision for the Comets but a pin for David Jenkins, 140, made the score 16 to 15 with Crater still leading. Dean Lamp, 147 stretched it to 19 to 15 for Crater. Bill Foust, 156, Medford, drew with Dave McGee then Al Funston, 167, of the Tornado gained a verdict for the 21 to 20 status.

Each team won five individual bouts and there were two draws.

Pro Cage Expansion Considered

Detroit — (UPI) — National Basketball association club owners, having disposed of several weighty problems, including the Elgin Baylor incident, resumed discussions today regarding possible expansion of the circuit.

League President Maurice Podoloff said the owners were confronted by numerous problems in their efforts to expand to the West Coast. Those problems included transportation, the obtaining of players to staff the new teams and the arrangement of a schedule "on a reasonably sound economic basis."

"If it were a question of such cities as Chicago, Cleveland, Pittsburgh or Baltimore, there would be no such problems involved," Podoloff said. "But the West Coast is a different matter. We would have to add two teams at the same time and that complicates matters."

The league's referees also were represented at Thursday's session and they told the owners they felt they would be better "protected" if they worked under contract rather than on a game-to-game basis as they do now.

The owners promised to "explore the problem" at the end of this season and said that a system of contracts probably would be put into effect next year.

President Bob Short of the Minneapolis Lakers said that henceforth he will insist that a non-segregation clause be included in all games played by his team in non-league cities.

Brazil, Chile World Tourney Court Victors

Santiago, Chile — (UPI) — The unbeaten United States team, well rested after a one-day break in the schedule, plays Puerto Rico tonight in the world amateur basketball tournament.

Another game in the championship flight will pit Bulgaria against Brazil.

While the Yanks rested Thursday night, Brazil whipped Nationalist China, 94-76, and Chile turned back Puerto Rico, 83-71. The United Arab Republic downed Canada, 71-69, in a consolation game.

Meanwhile, the secretary of the International Basketball Federation revealed "energetic measures" will be taken against Russia and Bulgaria if they refuse to play Nationalist China in the round robin tournament.
