Bills Reducing Required School Age Introduced

Salem (UPI)—Two bills reducing the age of compulsory education in Oregon from 18 to 16 years and rewriting the juvenile code have been introduced in the House.

Both bills were requested by the Interim Committee on Judicial Administration.

The juvenile code bill (HB 153) would give juvenile courts exclusive jurisdiction over children who violated any law or ordinance. This would include children beyond control of parents, who are considered dangerous, or who have run away.

Court Authority

The bill gives the court authority to arrange for a child's well-being, detention or commitment.

Hearings have been scheduled here Feb. 3 on a bill lowering the age at which minors can smoke from 18 to 16 years.

Rep. George Layman, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, said he thought there would be much interest in it and that persons from various parts of the state probably would appear.

Three bills involving migratory labor were introduced at the request of the Interim Committee on Migratory Labor.

House bill 159 prescribes sanitary standards for farm labor camps to be supervised by the State Board of Health.

Contractor Licenses

HB 160 provides for the licensing of farm labor contractors by the Bureau of Labor and provides for registration of crew leaders.

HB 161 permits deduction as business expense of construction costs of farm labor camps or camp facilities.

A bill authorizing the Oregon Centennial Commission to lease a site for this year's exposition and trade fair was introduced.

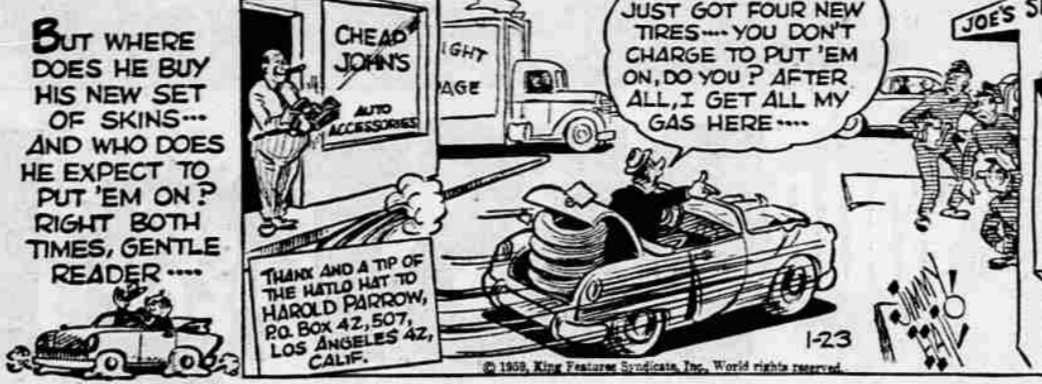
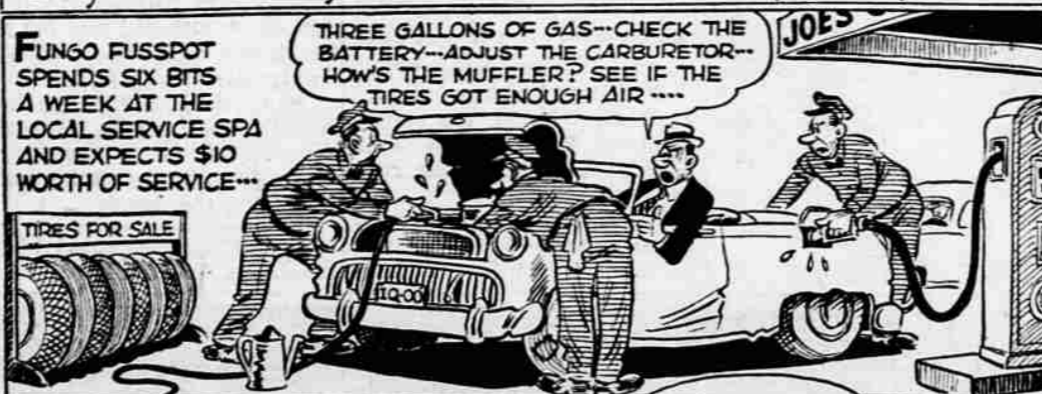
The bill permits the commission to contract for services and subcontract concessions. It also validates all acts the Commission already has taken to further such aims.

Small Worlds Around Us

Kingfisher Makes Good Use of Conveniences

Today's kingfishers really think telephone and light wires were put there for their express purpose, and they make the most of them. Some wires are just about the proper height above water to make ideal diving conditions. So wherever the wires parallel a roadside ditch, or a tidal flat, or cross a small stream, there sit the wise birds, carefully spaced one from another, all waiting for a fish to show up. Never do two of the birds sit together.

Each, too, is jealous of his or her own territory. Each has a favorite spot, and in this particular spot each bird is monarch of all he surveys.

When disturbed, the kingfisher will fly rapidly away, uttering a loud, rattling call that sounds something like a policeman's whistle. They seldom fly far, however, and then circle back.

The kingfisher lives entirely on fish, either salt or fresh water. They will not exactly "turn up their bills" at a toad, frog, or occasionally a small snake. These birds, of some variety, are found almost

He said he believes there is a new era of steady growth in the Ashland area and asked the council to establish an industrial area where a railroad spur could be available.

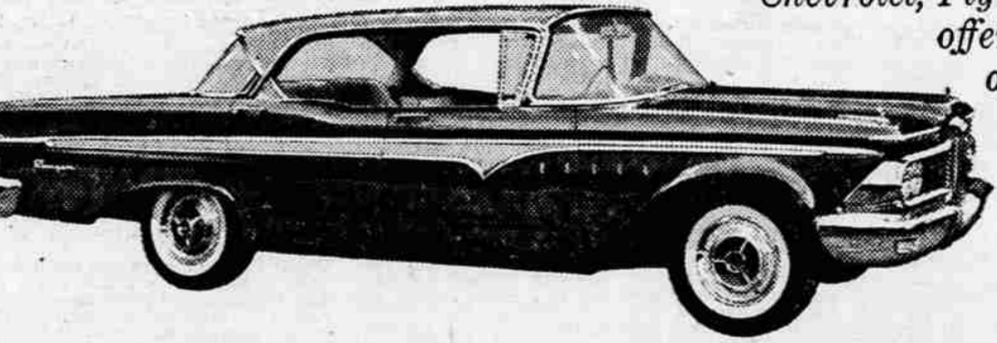
