Hawaii Program Slated at Airport

Helen Thompson, an entertainer from the Hawaiian islands, will be among those scheduled to appear at the Medford airport Jan. 27 in a preview of forthcoming all-jet service from the Pacific northwest to Hawaii.

Miss Thompson will be accompanied by Cookie Wasko and Ululani Keoloha, who will provide an Hawaiian program jointly sponsored by West Coast airlines, Aloha Airlines and Pan-American Airways.

West Coast has inaugurated prop-jet service with its Fairchild f-27s, and Aloha Airlines, which has headquarters in Honolulu, plans to start prop-jet service with Fairchild's new spring. Pan-American plans to offer jet service to the islands, connecting with West Coast at Portland and Seattle in late fall this year.

Medford is one of six locations in the Pacific northwest where the tour will stop with representatives of Aloha Airlines, officials of WCA and Pan-American.

Other locations include Eugene, Yakima, Wash., Lewiston, Ida., Boise, Ida., and Twin Falls, Ida.

TODAY In Oregon History (A Centennial Feature)

JANUARY 24, 1846
I brought the present state of the Oregon question before the Cabinet... I stated that there was no probability that any division of the territory could be agreed upon, or would be acceded to by the people of the U.S. . . . I then suggested as a possible basis of adjustment a treaty of commerce by which each country should stipulate to relax their restrictive systems . . . I insisted that the reduction of our tariff would be a great object with Great Britain, and that to attain it that Government might be willing to surrender her claim to the whole Oregon territory.

Diary of President Jas. K. Polk
JANUARY 25, 1821
Dr. John Floyd, Congressman from Virginia, introduced a bill into the House of Representatives which would authorize the President to occupy that portion of the territory of the United States on the headwaters of the Columbia River. This is the first measure introduced into Congress looking toward the annexation of Oregon.

Work of Marriage Counselling Topic Of Health Meeting

The Mental Health committee of Jackson county Thursday discussed the work of the volunteer marriage counseling service, which soon will be terminated, and the next steps to be taken leading toward establishment of a permanent family service with a professional staff.

Dr. Harry Danielson, psychiatrist, announced that new cases will be accepted by the marriage counseling service during the remaining days of January, and that the counselors would continue to see the couples they are working with for a month or two longer if it is deemed advisable.

The procedure for those who wish to avail themselves of the service in the few remaining days is to call the Child Guidance Clinic at SPRING 3-3174. Appointments with the counselors are made through that office.

Tom Goff, psychiatric social worker with the Child Guidance Clinic, reported that there have been a total of 32 referrals which got as far as at least one interview with the counselors. Nearly all of these have been self-referrals. This was regarded as favorable, since those who seek a service are more apt to benefit from it. Many of the couples have had a considerable number of interviews with the counselors.

Miss Celia Walker, chairman of the Mental Health committee, reported that Mrs. Freida Burnside, of the Family Service Agency of America had accepted an invitation to come to Medford Feb. 26 and 27.

The purpose of her visit will be to assist in the evaluation of the volunteer service and the discussion of next steps to be taken by the community to make such service continuously available. Miss Walker appointed a committee to arrange for the schedule of Mrs. Burnside on those two days, Mrs. Henry Padgham, Mrs. Robert Minear and another person to be selected by them.

Dr. and Mrs. John Waterman were visitors at the meeting and took part in the discussions. Dr. Waterman is director of mental health for the state board of health. The Watermans also visited the weekly meeting of the counselors with Dr. Danielson on Thursday afternoon.

Reeder Discusses Civil Rights at Ashland Meeting

Ashland-District Attorney Thomas Reeder spoke on "Provisions of the Oregon Law Pertaining to Discrimination" at a meeting of the Ashland Human Rights council Jan. 20 in the Ashland Public Library. It was the first in a series of monthly study meetings planned by the group.

The so-called civil rights laws of Oregon are those which make it unlawful to discriminate against a person on the basis of race, religion, color or national origin, Reeder said. They are administered by the bureau of labor and cover the areas of employment, housing places of public accommodation and vocational, professional or trade schools licensed by the state.

According to Reeder, probably the most important of such laws are those which deal with employment, since economic freedom cuts across nearly any other freedom which we might have. The fair employment practices laws cover employers, labor unions and employment services, he noted.

Violations of the anti-discrimination laws may be reported by writing to Mark A. Smith, administrator of the civil rights division of the bureau of labor. The office makes investigations and determines if there is sufficient evidence to justify a hearing.

Reeder pointed out that within a limited range, Oregon's civil rights laws are useful. However, since violations are somewhat hard to prove, the laws are difficult to administer.

According to Reeder, the real solution to peaceful and equitable race relations probably does not lie entirely in the enforcement of these laws. Rather, the meaningful civil rights in Oregon and the country are contained in the Constitution, he said.

Following his talk, there was a question period during which Reeder explained certain aspects of the laws more fully.

Drivers License Suspensions Rise

Salem—Failure to comply with the state's financial responsibility laws last year resulted in license suspensions for 21,267 operators of motor vehicles, the Oregon department of motor vehicles has reported.

The figure represents an increase of slightly more than 6,000 over 1957.

Officials said reasons for suspensions under financial responsibility provisions of the law included: driver or owner involved in an uninsured accident, 7,849; unjustified judgment, 266; failure to maintain proof of financial

responsibility, 6,514; failure to report an accident, 106; and failure to meet security requirements, 1,318.

The department said 32,307 vehicles involved in accidents last year reported damages in excess of \$50 and that 6,111 of the 95,200 vehicles involved did not have insurance.

Claims evaluated by financial responsibility personnel during the year revealed that the average claim for property damages in uninsured accidents was \$248 and for personal injury, \$529.
