Rescuers Hope to Check River's Flow

Pittsburgh, Pa. (UPI)—Rescuers said Saturday they hoped to plug up within 24 to 36 hours the gaping hole which is pouring swirling flood waters into a mine where 12 men have been trapped since Thursday.

No attempt to get down into the mine tunnel can be made until the 20 foot hole gouged by the ice-laden Susquehan-

na river can be corked.

It has been reported that there were 56 men in the tunnel of the Knox Coal co. when the river broke through but company Superintendent Robert Grove said Saturday that there had been 86 in the operation with all but the 12 groping their way to safety.
