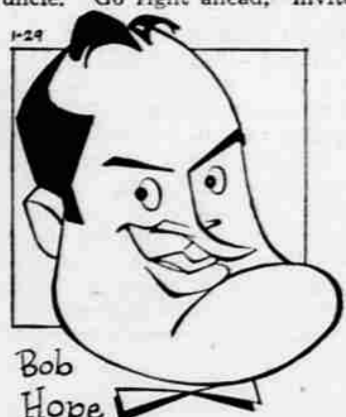


Try and Stop Me

Low-Powered Nuclear Reactor Bought by OSC

Corvallis — A low-powered nuclear reactor that is especially designed for training students in physics, chemistry, chemical engineering, and mechanical engineering has been purchased by Oregon State college and installed in an engineering laboratory.

It is one of 50 reactors in the country, and OSC is one of only 42 U.S. schools having a graduate program approved by the Atomic Energy Commission for fellowships in nuclear science and engineering.

Purchase of the reactor was made possible with a \$165,000 grant from AEC.

With the reactor, students can acquire the knowledge and skills that will prepare them for work in atomic energy fields, George W. Gleason, dean of engineering, explained. The Atomic Energy Commission has forecast a serious shortage of trained workers unless atomic energy education is expanded, he added.

Can Be Sustained

The reactor is 6½ feet in diameter, 9 feet high, and weighs 22,000 pounds, including 7,500 pounds of lead shielding. It gets its name from the "chain reactions" that come from the uranium-235 core used as fuel. The reaction which produces atomic energy can be sustained under controlled conditions, Gleason explained.

The 3.13 pound uranium core, loaned to the college by the Atomic Energy Commission, is valued at \$10,500 and has indefinite life for reactor use. It is sealed in a special container. The reactor has been licensed by AEC as completely safe for campus installation, but is fenced off in a restricted area within the engineering laboratory.

Sailor Deserter Given Sentence

San Francisco — (UPI) — Calton Vance Mings isn't the crying type — but he cried twice Wednesday.

The 38-year-old sailor wept in anguish when a Navy court martial board at Treasure Island found him guilty of desertion in wartime.

But he cried with joy when the sentence was announced. He received six months at hard labor, a dishonorable discharge, and was reduced in rank to fireman apprentice.

Mings, who walked off the cruiser Chester three months before the war ended, was AWOL for 13 years. In that time, he acquired a wife, three children and an unblemished reputation.

He was arrested by the FBI on desertion charges last August.

The court martial board apparently took Mings' reputation as a family man and provider into consideration. It apparently also considered his war record in the Pacific prior to the time he left the Chester.

The sentence is subject to review by higher naval authorities, but Mings is satisfied.

"I got a fair break," he said.

Teamsters Eye Retail Clerks

Monterey, Calif. — (UPI) — The Executive Board of the Western Conference of Teamsters opened its quarterly meeting today with plans for an organizational drive of retail clerks expected to be high on the agenda.

Conference officials have declined comment on reports of the planned organizational drive.

The conference Policy Committee opened its quarterly meeting Wednesday and decided to recommend to the Executive Board the appointment of an insurance actuary to counsel the board on the union's retirement and insurance program.

Einar Mohn, San Francisco, conference president, said he expected no formal action to be taken on Gov. Edmund G. Brown's tax proposals but declared that labor has traditionally opposed consumer taxes.

The conference represents 300,000 union members in the 11 Western states.

Ben-Gurion Hints At Immigration

Tel Aviv — (UPI) — Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion Wednesday night strongly hinted at the possibility of large-scale Jewish immigration here from Russia.

Ben-Gurion, addressing a rally for an immigration loan to aid Jews being allowed to come here from Communist Romania, said "there is reason to believe that if we absorb the present wave of 250,000 to 300,000 Jewish immigrants, the gates will be opened to the greatest concentration of Jews in the old world."

"If emigration were permitted from that country," he added "it would be the greatest miracle in our history."

Ben-Gurion did not mention the Soviet Union by name but it was plain that that is what he meant.

Nat King Cole Cancels Cuba Trip

Hollywood — (UPI) — Singer Nat King Cole has cancelled plans for a two-week engagement in troubled Cuba.

A spokesman for the singer said Wednesday night Cole was to have appeared at Havana's Tropicana where he has performed for the past three years. The nightclub was closed temporarily because of the Cuban revolution.

However, the singer still plans a Latin tour which would take him to Puerto Rico, Venezuela, Brazil, Uruguay, Argentina, Chile and Peru.

Westinghouse Test Winners Announced

Washington — (UPI) — Five high school seniors from California and Montana were among 40 students named today in the Westinghouse Corporation's annual science talent search contest.

The 40 finalists were picked from over 28,000 of the nation's most promising future scientists. The nine girls and 31 boys have been awarded all-expense trips to Washington, where they will vie for \$34,250 in scholarships and awards during a five-day competition starting Feb. 26.

The three California winners were: Sheri Lynn Weaver, 16, Concord; Thomas Chadbourne Emmel, 17, Los Angeles; and Carl Lewis Lyngholm, 17, San Diego.

The two Montana winners were: Nancy June Balmar, 17, Great Falls; and Richard John O'Connell, Helena.

Tarbes, France — (UPI) — French army Gen. Pierre Agostini, 55, collapsed and died of a heart attack Wednesday while reviewing a regiment of paratroopers.

Berlin Meeting Offer Renewed

Paris — (UPI) — The Western Big Three are preparing to renew their offer to Moscow of a meeting with Soviet leaders on Berlin, diplomatic sources here said today.

Reports from London said the talks would be held at the foreign ministers' level. They said no firm date would be proposed, but that the meeting probably would take place toward the end of April in Geneva.

The London sources said the foreign ministers of Britain, the United States, France and West Germany would meet in Paris in March to align Western strategy and agree on proposals to be made at the Big Four talks.

Diplomatic sources in the French capital said the West, in renewing their offer of a Berlin conference made last Dec. 31, would make it plain to the Russians that they were not being "panicked" by the Soviet demand that the West get out of Berlin by next May 27.

Five Youths Die In Auto Accident

Cocoa Beach, Fla. — (UPI) — Five teen-age boys were killed and two others seriously injured early today when their auto slammed into a barricade on the beach.

Police said the car was traveling about 75 miles an hour on the foggy, unlighted beach when it crashed into a 10-inch metal pipe extending over the top of wooden pilings. The pipe ripped away the top of the car and took parts of the boys' heads with it.

The dead were tentatively identified from wallets found on the ground. They were listed as James E. Weaver, Kenneth L. D. Gardner, John Edward Roquemore, Richard Charles Knobler, and Nickie Hendrick Morgan, all 18 years old and all from Orlando, Fla.

Audrey Hepburn Injured in Fall

Hollywood — (UPI) — Actress Audrey Hepburn has been injured in a fall from a horse on location near Durango, Mexico, a spokesman for Hecht-Lancaster Productions said today.

Joe Hyams said he received word Wednesday night that the petite film star had suffered four broken ribs and a sprained leg. He said she was being treated in a private home because of a lack of hospital facilities.

Miss Hepburn was thrown from a horse when the animal stumbled during scenes of "The Unforgiven" according to Hyams.

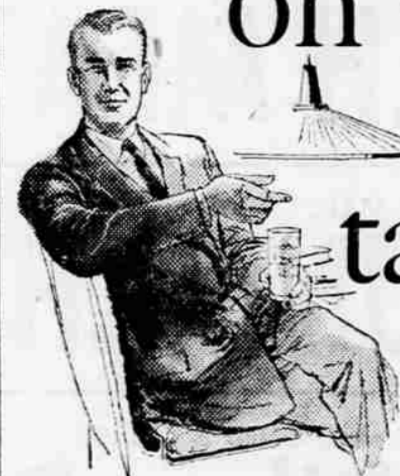
